Contributions Announced at Convention in Boston-Hosts Fined Themselves For Disappointment

Boston, July 8-At the Zionist Convention Samuel H. Borossky offered the following resolution, which was signed by himself and several other delegates: "Resolved that a committee of ten be

"Resolved that a committee of ten be appointed by the chair to define and establish the rights, powers and duties of the provisional Zionist convention, and the form and manner of representation therein; and to report the same to this convention for a ratification."

The resolution was offered to the committee on resolutions. A matter which occasioned much debate was the question of the assumption by the federation of the liabilities and property of the Yiddische Folk, the most important Jewish publication in the United States. There were four items under consideration in connection with the resolution, and at length it was adopted and the federation accordingly will assume full control of the publication. Grand Master Joseph Barondess made an earnest plea for the publication, and Mrs. Richard Gottheil, wife of Professor Gottheil, of Columbia University, announced that she would donate \$100 towards the publication.

The Boston Society penalized itself for the disappointments to many who were not able to secure seats at the banquet by paying \$500 to the federation and \$500 to the Sons of Zion.

In response to the call from Doctor Wise for contributions to the Jewish work in Palestine for next year, it was announced that nearly \$100,000 had already been subscribed.


