OTTAWA, March 17—Questions put to J. E. A. Bisaillon, former chief preventive officer in Montreal, by Hon. H. H. Stevens, during the progress of the customs investigation this afternoon drew protest from Oscar Gagnon, counsel for the witness.

It was at this point that Mr. Gagnon intervened. He claimed that the witness should not be required to answer such a question unless he was given access to his own books and ords. Mr. Bisaillon said the deposits referred to could be explained quite easily but he must have time to examine his books.

OBJECTION REGISTERED.

No steps have been taken to appeal the conviction. The defendants have


30 days from the date of conviction to file notice of appeal.




