

New York, Nov. 26—Princess Spot-tiswood-Mackin, who died in Harrison, N. Y., on August 21, left \$1,000 for the erection of a monument to herself with the inscription: "She did what she could for humanity.—Sallie Britton, Princess Spottiswood-Mackin," and re-quested that she be buried in the habit of the Benedictine order. Her will was filed for probate in the Surrogates' Court.

All her property in Rome, except her money, securities, jewelry and laces, will go to Counters Valentina Vanui-telli Venturini, niece of Cardinal Canui-telli, Papal Secretary of State, with whom she frequently visited during her trips abroad. St. Patrick's Cathedral receives a bequest of \$1,000 and the Catholic Church at Troy, Mo., \$500. Her sisters, Elizabeth B. Katte of 784 Park avenue, and Fannie B. Nisbet of

The Papal Princess, whose title was bestowed by Pope Benedict XV., was formerly Sallie Britton of St. Louis, and later the wife of State Senator James Mackin of New York. After the death of her husband she was converted to the Catholic Church and was re-ceived with special honors at the Buch-aristic Congress in Paris in 1908. She was an intimate friend of Cardinal Vanuitell's niece, and the entree she obtained to the Vatican was said to be largely due to the cardinal's influence. Being a beautiful woman and re-puted to be wealthy, hardly a year went past that she was not reported to be engaged to some member of the nobility of France or Italy, but she al-ways denied the rumors and never married after Senator Mackin died. At one time she was reported to be en-gaged to the Duke del Monte. The residue of the estate, the value of which is not given, is left in trust for the support and maintenance of her nephew, Robert L. Nisbet of White Plains. The Princess was 78 at her death.


