

An article appeared in the local papers recently to the effect that bakeries could take a certain portion of their allotment of sugar and have it ground for icing purposes. The order issued at Ottober 1918, no person in Canada shall without special permit manufacture for sale any icing sugar, icing powder or any preparation of sugar which is used largely for icing cakes or biscuits, the use of which is prohibited." This order has not been revoked.
