The Ontarios and Wanderers are said to have lost each \$8,000. Canadians made \$8,000, Ottawa \$4,000, and Quebec, \$8,000, while Toronto will finish more than \$8,000 ahead. The Blue Shirts would have made more than this, but the injury to Cameron early in the season cost them \$1,500, as they had to buy and pay Con Corbett and George McNamara. The latter cost the club \$500 for his release from the Ontarios.

Rule Should be Settled

Milwaukee, Wis., March 11.—There has been considerable argument in this country of late about the boxing rules, especially regarding clean breaks, etc. Different interpretations are given by referees and boxing commissioners regarding these, and as a result the boxers are confused at times as to what rule to follow. The same trouble has been experienced in England, the home of boxing, and in speaking of the matter, Mr. Dyer writes me as follows: "The rules governing boxing are by no means clear on many points, a great deal, perhaps too much, being left to the discretion of the third man in the ring. Especially is this the case with the much disputed question of clean breaks and infighting. American and British ideas are totally at variance on the point, though it must be said that the American style of boxing is becoming more and more the fashion with our principal glove artists. "The Queensbury rules contain nothing regulating what is known here as the clean break and a boxer is perfectly

Made Nice Sum.

Receipts of the night's ten-round bout between Willie Ritchie and Ad Wolgast amounted to \$89,906. Forty per cent of this amount, \$35,922 went to Ritchie. Wolgast received \$11,941, 80 per cent and the promoters divided \$9,982. The state commission received \$1,900.

The contract for the bout provided that Ritchie could receive 40 per cent of the receipts and Wolgast 80 per cent, or that Wolgast could receive 70 per cent of the total receipts out of which he would have to pay Ritchie \$10,000. The champion chose the 40 per cent.
