

Campaign to Secure Labor on the Farms

Ontario Government May Organize it if the Dominion Doesn't Take Matter Up

Toronto, Feb. 2—A big campaign will likely soon be inaugurated by the On-tario government for the speeding up of farm production during the year. Re-cruiting stations are to be placed throughout the city where men who for some reason or other are unable to serve at the front may serve at home by increasing food production. It is the belief of government officials that as far as Ontario is concerned it may not be necessary to draft men to serve on the farms. If the draft me-thod is decided upon by the Dominion
