LOCAL BANK MATTERS

H. A. Richardson, general manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, who arrived in the city yesterday, says that it will be the policy of the bank to cater especially to the needs of the people of the maritime provinces, that the bank would do all in its power to develop the resources of the provinces and cater to the needs of the business men, and that their funds would be at the service of legitimate business enterprises in these provinces. Mr. Richardson will remain in St. John for some time after the amalgamation has taken place, and later on will fill a position of importance.

Mr. Richardson said that there should be an enormous expansion at this port with the heavy growth in trade and traffic. He believed that the trade would increase more rapidly than it could be handled at this port, and that eventually a \$10,000,000 bank would be needed for the overdraft. Some \$50,000 in Bank of Nova Scotia stock notes were burned in the bank furnace yesterday, and as the amalgamation is completed the whole bank of \$1,000,000 will be called in and destroyed.
