HOME RULE MATTERS FROM BOTH SIDES

(Times' Special Correspondence) British troops, and his answer was unhesitatingly "Yes."

Dublin, April 5.—The British League for the Support of Ulster and the Union has issued an appeal in which it says:—

The government has announced their determination to take full advantage of the provisions of the Home Rule Act in order to establish a parliament and executive in Dublin in spite of the sworn intention of the men of Ulster to resist this measure by every means in their power.

"We desire to point out to our countrymen that this determination does not affect Ulster alone. We believe that the repeal of the union would be fatal to the prosperity of Ireland, to the safety of the United Kingdom and to the consolidation of the empire. We also believe that to force the home rule bill into law while the constitution is in suspense, and with grave changes affected by Ulster, is to invite disaster to the country."

"It is quite clear that the men of Ulster are not fighting only for their own liberties. Ulster will be the field on which the privileges of the whole nation will be lost or won."

"We therefore appeal to all British citizens who sympathize with Ulster, and who value their own freedom, to join the league that has been formed to support the men of Ulster in the great struggle that lies before them. All who wish to join are requested to send their names and addresses to the Honorary Secretary, T. Connors, Flat 25, Ryder street, St. James' together with a contribution to a fund that has been opened for carrying on men movements."

The appeal is signed by three or four hundred prominent Unionists. It is expected that the government will reintroduce the home rule bill in the House of Commons just before Whit Sunday. There is every probability that a parliamentary election will be allowed for the second reading, but that the subsequent stages will be merely formal.

An anti-home rule demonstration, attended by members of Unionist clubs in Belfast and district, was held a few days ago in Dundonald, County Down. The demonstration was organized by the Queen's Island Shipyard Club and the Cliftonville Club. About 6,000 men took part in a procession, and they were loudly cheered by the crowds lining both sides of the route. The meeting was held in a field surrounded by the Castlerough Hills. The proceedings opened there were between 30,000 and 35,000 people present.

E. Selator, president of the Unionist Club of Ireland, occupied the chair, which was one in which King William once sat, being lent for the occasion. After the singing of the first verse of "God our help in Ages past," Rev. T. G. Collins led in prayer. The chairman said the Unionists of Ulster had entered into their solemn league and covenant each with one another to defeat the present conspiracy to set up a home rule parliament in Ireland, and in the event of one being set up to refuse to recognize its authority. They had never doubted their ability to carry out their resolve.

Lord Londonderry asked the working men of Belfast to trust their leaders implicitly. Let them do nothing rash or foolish. Their leaders had led with wisdom, and they had followed with trustfulness and common-sense.
