LOCAL NEWS

EXPECT 3,500 MEN IN CAMP THIS YEAR

Recruiting Begins To Get All Units up to Strength

MORE ARTILLERY THERE

Also New Cavalry and Corps of Guides — It is Believed That a Camp Commander Will be Colonel Humphrey, D. O. C.

The work of recruiting in the interests of the militia units which will take their annual training at Sussex Camp has begun. The ambition of every unit is to go full strength into camp in the hope of making a good showing, and every endeavor is being put forth to roll to the limit in each corps, company or regiment. It is expected to be a very large camp this year, the estimated number of men under canvas being about 3,500 with probably Colonel Humphrey, D. O. C. in command. It is not certain that this will be the case, but this is the expectation, local militia men thinking that he will have command with Colonel Rutherford going to Aldershot.

The number of men under canvas at Sussex this year will be swollen by three batteries of artillery which drilled last year at Petawawa, namely the 10th, 12th and 19th. Five battalions of infantry will be stationed at the camp, the four rural regiments which drill there annually, the 71st, 73rd, 74th and 87th for the full period and the 62nd Fusiliers of this city which will go in for their usual drill over Dominion Day, in command of Col. J. L. McAvity. In addition to these there will be the new mounted Corps of Guides, the two cavalry regiments, and the 8th Princess Louise Dragoons, the 8th Hussars, No. 8 Signaling Section the Army Service Corps and "A" Company from the R. C. R., Fredericton. The latter body under Major A. E. Masie will encamp about ninety strong, from this city for the most part. The work of drawing recruits has now commenced with this, the only local corps to take more than a mere handful of men to camp. They had their first drill last night. The local Army Medical Corps under Colonel Walker, which for years encamped at Sussex, will again go to Aldershot as they did last year, their place being taken by the same body which was at Sussex the last annual camp, the Field Hospital Corps from Nova Scotia, under Major Ford. The local "medics" will have their first drill on next Tuesday evening and will continue until the time of going to Aldershot in September.

Camp to Open on June 24

This year's camp will be opened on June 24 and will continue for about two weeks. The main bodies which will drill there will arrive on the day being preceded by the advance parties which will go up-street on June 21, consisting of the Army Service Corps, the R. C. R., and advances from other regiments. The grounds are now being put in shape for the opening and will continue at work right up to the opening day.

The presence of motor cars for the officers on field duty was very noticeable last year and will probably be more so this year as an allowance has been provided, from \$5 to \$8 a day, with an extra grant of \$1 a night for garage. Horse allowance in cavalry and artillery units has been increased from \$1 to \$1.25. There has been an increase in the command pay of officers of independent corps.

It is planned to have the local N. B. 3rd C. A. gradually work into field battery and several men will be trained this year in riding, both here and in Petawawa with this end in view. Authority has been given Lieut. Col. B. R. Armstrong, to enlist twenty horses a battery for drilling at local quarters so that this would carry on an amount of sixty horses. About twenty-five have now been secured, for which the allowance of \$1.25 will be given.

FORMER MONCTON MAN DEAD IN KENTUCKY; LEAVES LARGE ESTATE

H. F. Hamilton Has News of Passing Away of Wm. White — Railway Town Does Not Keep Holiday — Baseball

Moncton, June 3—H. F. Hamilton, last night received a telegram from Louisville, Ky., informing him of the death of William White, formerly a well known resident of Moncton. Mr. White left here when about twenty one years of age and went to Louisville after the civil war, engaged in the dry goods business, and was very successful. He was sixty-eight or seventy years old, unmarried and is survived by one brother John White of Amherst. He leaves a large estate.

The King's birthday is not being generally observed as a holiday here. The banks, postoffice, customs, city schools and city market are closed but the Intercolonial railway shops are working as usual while industrial concerns, merchants and professional men are not observing the day. In other words only a small proportion of the population are taking advantage of the holiday.

It seems to be settled that Moncton is to have semi-professional baseball. At a meeting of promoters last night it was decided to run a three team league opening on June 14. One professional will be engaged for each team. The Commercial Club is taking an active interest in the movement for a semi-professional ball league, promising financial assistance.

THE JUDGESHIPS

The intimation that the conferring of a judgeship upon Chief Justice Frederick Barker will be followed by his honor's retirement has aroused considerable interest in the changes on the bench which would follow, and is in line with the Times' announcement of some months ago.

It is believed that the retirement of the Chief Justice would be followed by the elevation of Judge McLeod to that important office, but that Judge McLeod would be content to occupy it for a comparatively short period and then would retire, thus leaving another opening to be filled.

An extra judgeship was recently created and it has been taken for granted that Attorney-General Grimmer had his own appointment as judge in mind when the legislation was adopted. There has been a strong demand from the legal profession that the next vacancy on the bench should be filled by the appointment of M. G. Teed, K.C., as the one most entitled to the honor but the retirement of the chief justice would give room for both Mr. Grimmer and Mr. Teed.

The appointment of the attorney-general to the bench would mean, it has been said, the appointment of Hon. Geo. J. Clarke, speaker of the assembly, to the office Mr. Grimmer would vacate. More recently, however, the name of Recorder Baxter has been mentioned more prominently in this connection and it is believed that his chances are at least equal for the office. In this case it is supposed that Mr. Baxter would find it necessary to resign the recordership and another attractive office would be open to one of the local lawyers.

GOING WELL ALONG

Work on the new building being erected on the grounds of the Knights of Columbus in Colborne street is progressing favorably, but it will be several weeks before it is ready for occupancy. The new structure, which will be connected with the present building, of which it is to be an extension, is being built of brick and from what is already to be seen of it there is no doubt that it will be a creditable addition to the present handsome quarters of the knights. Facings of stone add effectively to the attractiveness of its appearance.
