AGED I. C. R. MAN HAS FOOT AMPUTATED AS RESULT OF ACCIDENT IN TRURO YARD TODAY

(Special To The Times) Truro, N. S., Oct. 29.—Elias Nelson, one of the oldest employes of the I. C. R., while on duty in the I. C. R. yard this morning, slipped as he jumped from a car, which was being shunted. The train ran over his foot. He was conveyed to the Truro Hospital, where doctors McLean and Dunbar found that amputation of the foot was necessary. The operation was performed at eleven o'clock. Nelson is an old and trusted employe, having been in the services of the railway for about thirty-five years. He was about to be superannuated.

FLOOD FROM SKIES; 54 PEOPLE DROWN
