Regarding the list of names furnished by the union, prominent contractor says that none of the number employ more than one or two men, and that many of them have none but themselves working. They say A. E. Hamilton, Ltd., and J. Drury & Son are the only large firms paying the new rate. Samuel C. Drury said today that he had notified his men that he would pay the new scale other than that he did not care to have any comment.

Edward Bates remarked that he was running an open shop. "We pay what a man is worth; an energetic man gets treated differently from a lazy one," said Mr. Bates. He said that he employed twelve to fourteen men all year round, and felt that he was using them fair. James Miles has all his men out, sixteen or twelve, as has Robert J. Green, who is associated with Messrs. Moore in the work on the King Edward school. Mr. Green said that on his present contract, at the rate he would not pay the advanced wage. He said that he understood that some exception would be made in his case, but he had a contract running five months. Organizer Potts had given him to understand that his case was different. The men, however, had not returned to work and Mr. Green said so far as he was concerned he would not permit them to work again this week. "Their conduct is outrageous," said Mr. Green. Medley Belyea, who is doing the work of the new apartment house on Prince William street, has but two or three men of his eight or ten working, and it was said today James McDonald, who employ six or eight men, has all his men out.
