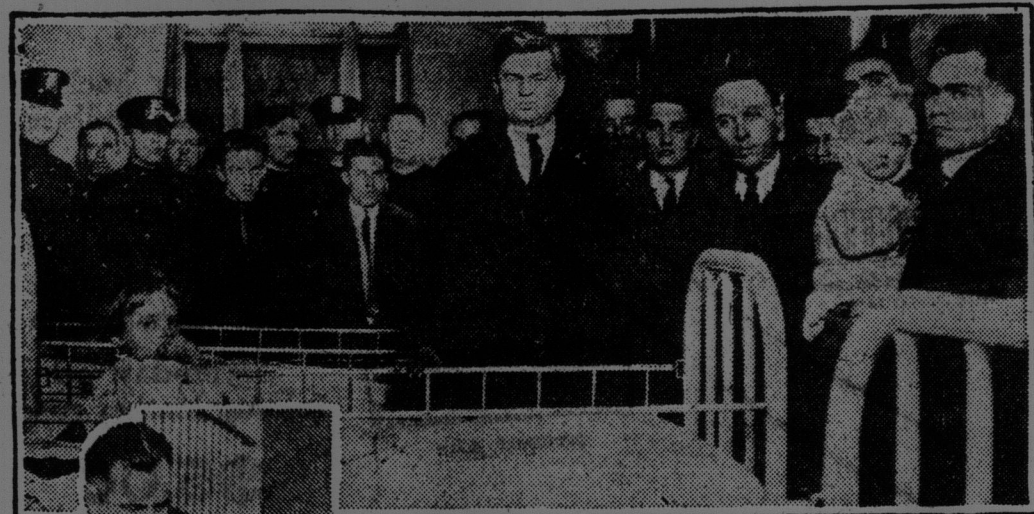


Speeders Travel "In Low" As Auto Death Toll Mounts High

New York, Dec. 12.—The speeder, greater menace to life and limb in the United States last year than snailpox, tuberculosis and several other diseases combined, is being forced to go into "reverse."

ALL PAY FOR THE ESCAPE OF ONE

Sing Sing Cells Close on
1,200 Convicts for a Day
to Teach a Community
Lesson.

New York, Dec. 12.—Because Patrick
Dealey, a Sing Sing inmate actor and
long-term prisoner, escaped early on
Saturday morning, prison officials took
recreation privileges away from the
1,200 inmates of the Ossining institu-
tion for a day. They were locked in
their cells for twenty-four hours, it was
announced, when the period of unusual
confinement ended.

The cell doors closed early on Sat-
urday afternoon. The customary picture
show for the convicts on Saturday
night was omitted and not a man
emerged until Sunday afternoon except
to go to meals and to church services.

"Was that done to punish them?"
was asked of Warden Byles.

"No," he replied, and Charles F. Na-
tigan, State Superintendent of Prisons,
dined, "it was for discipline." added the
warden. "We wish the inmates to un-
derstand that recreation is a privilege
and not a right. We wish to impress
upon them that the system here is
based upon community-interest and
that there must be group-responsibil-
ity."

Superintendent Rattigan predicted
that if there is another show for out-
side public such as the musical comedy
the close of which Dealey escaped,
there will be no more escapes.

"It is a community," he said, "and
it is a Warden Lawes' time. He did not
replenish what new precautions had been
devised."

Search for Dealey was pressed with-
out success. Visiting records were in-
vestigated to find out who had called
on Dealey in prison. His brother,
Hugh Dealey, was one visitor and Miss
Helen McAndrews of 2241 Eighth ave-
nue, Manhattan, was the other. Miss
McAndrews, according to prison at-
tendants, attended the prison show on
two nights. Prison officials and guards
declared that, so far as they had ob-
served, she did not get near Dealey.

Officials corrected two mistakes that
have been made. At regular visits
keepers hear the conversations between
inmates and callers, who do not come
into actual contact.

"We doubt very much if a woman
helped Dealey to get away," said Wil-
helm Lawes, the warden. He was
inclined to the opinion that the two young
men, friends of Dealey, helped him to
escape. The performance, aided him if he
had outside assistance. These two young
men have not been eliminated as possi-
ble. The warden said he was not
overcome to cover his gray uniform and
to get away once he had walked out
the front door with departing patrons.

Circulars with pictures and a pedi-
gree of Dealey, offering the customary
reward, were sent broadcast. Offi-
cials are hopeful of Dealey's recapture
because the left side of his face ap-
pears conspicuously due to an injury.

SOME DANCE STEPS BARRED BY POLICE

Mrs. Loft, New York Deputy
Commissioner, Persuades
Proprietors to Agree to
Reform.

New York, Dec. 12.—Dance hall prop-
rietors of New York City are forming
an organization for the elimina-
tion of the "Chicago," "ballooning,"
"stir" dancing and "parking" from the
public dance halls of New York City.

The agreement of the principle dance
hall proprietors to form an organiza-
tion to bar objectionable steps was
brought about by Mrs. George W. Loft,
Deputy Police Commissioner, who called
them together at a meeting at the
West Thirty-seventh street police sta-
tion.

Mrs. Loft told those assembled that
slow and light dancing was permitted
in the dance halls, but that complaints
from mothers were mounting the Police
Department and that Commissioner
measures by way of arrests and the
cancellations of licenses to put a stop
to it. She said that Commissioner
right had suggested as a possible alter-
native the voluntary purification of
public dancing by the dance hall prop-
rietors.

Proprietors Agree to Ban.

All the dance hall proprietors agreed
that voluntary action was desirable.

"The worst dancing is at the best
hotels," one of the dance hall prop-
rietors said at the meeting of proprietors
after Mrs. Loft had outlined her views.
She is said to have agreed with this,
but to have commented that such dan-
cing was not so pernicious because it
affected comparatively few, while thou-
sands were trained in various styles of
dancing at the public halls. It was said
to be impracticable, from the police
standpoint, to regulate closely what
took place at private affairs.

One of the dance hall proprietors
said that no form of dancing was so
bad as the failure to dance, which is
now said to be becoming popular on
many floors in New York City. This
dance was technically described as
"parking" by the man who denounced
it.

Variances of "Parking."

"Parking," he said, "is when a cou-
ple takes the floor to dance and then
stop dancing. They simply stay on the
one spot all through the dance. There
are any number of variations to this."

"The Chicago" was described as a
step of dancing in which the couple
rather than to the dance. "Ballooning"
was described concisely as
"rough."

In general the plan of reform, it was
said yesterday, is to introduce a notice-
able distance and a broader motion in
public dancing. Several of the large
dancing places, it was pointed out, have
sets of floor managers, sometimes call-
ed umpires or referees, who compel
observance of the rules of the hall as
to the types of dancing. It is charged,
however, that the evasions of the rules
are more insidious than the violations.

Mrs. Loft told the dance hall prop-
rietors that if voluntary action failed
