**PLANS NATIONAL WILSON FORUMS**

N. Y. Business Man as Sponsor Says They Will Perpetuate Ideals — Project Has O. K. of Former President.

New York, Jan. 8.—The launching of a movement to establish Woodrow Wilson forums throughout the country, to perpetuate the ideals and aspirations of the former President, is announced by Harry H. Schlacht, president of the Downtown Chamber of Commerce.

The first step in the establishment of the national organization will be the opening of a forum in New York City on Jan. 14, in public school 62, on the East Side. With the interest which has been expressed in the movement throughout the country, Schlacht said today, the organization to national proportions. Will Discuss Ideals.

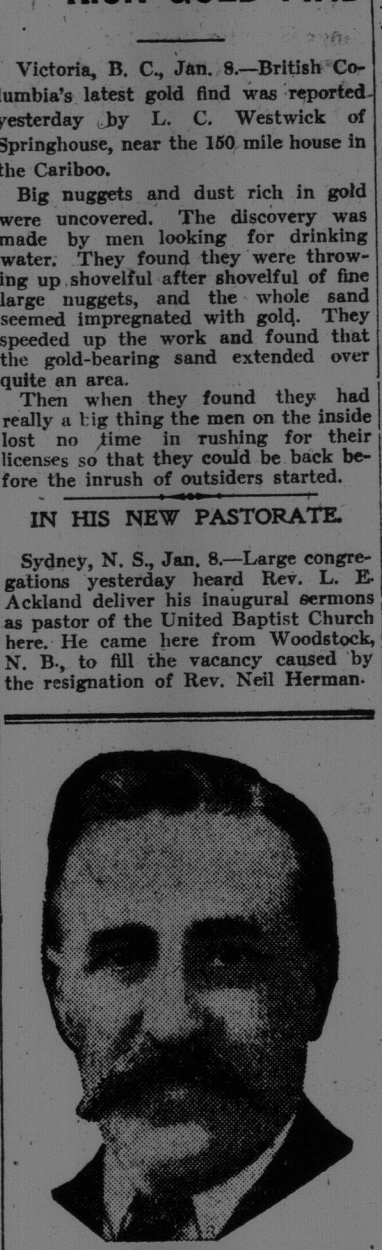

**DRESS BUDGET PUT AT \$5,000**

Mme. Paquin Thinks it Fair Amount for Woman to Spend Annually—Famous Modiste Employs Critics.

Paris, Jan. 8.—"Why do women's dresses cost so much?" This eternal question was put to Madame Jeanne Paquin, and her cryptic answer was "They don't."

For 33 years Mme. Paquin has been making dresses in Paris for the wealthy from all parts of the world. It may be here indicated that it is expensive to dress here, but the class of trade which motivates up to her doors, and nevertheless her answer was the sincere expression of a business woman. In the next breath she said: "Or rather, dresses do not cost the buyer so much, when it is considered what they cost the producer."

4,000 Dresses a Year.

Mme. Paquin employs about 900 persons, and turns out 4,000 dresses a year. About 25 out of every 100 of her gowns have to be discarded because they are not properly made.

"I employ people who do nothing but sit around and criticize our dresses," said Mme. Paquin. "And if a given dress doesn't satisfy them, a new one must be made for the client."

"How much does it cost to dress a woman well for a year?" Mme. Paquin was asked.
