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Moore Smashes Two Records In One Day

Clips Fifth of a Second Off Gorman's Mark for 440 and 21 2-5 Off Three Mile Record

World's records went by the board Saturday at Lake Placid when Joe Moore, of New York, skated the 440 yards in 87.2-5 seconds, one-fifth of a second faster than the former record established by Charles Gorman of this city, and the three miles in 8 minutes 21.2-5 seconds, one-fifth of a second faster than the former record held by Richard Donovan of Endicott.

In the 440 yards Jewstraw took the lead and had to relinquish it to Gorman. Just before entering the final stretch Jewstraw again forged into the lead, but Moore uncorked a terrific burst of speed and left both of the other skaters behind.

In the three mile Steimetz set a hard pace and won the lap prize. Jewstraw and Gorman dropped out, and Roy McWhirter fell. Moore again started a sprint and won out.

William Logan won his heat in the half mile, but lost out in the final to Parody of Lake Placid after a great fight.

QUESTIONS IN COMMONS

Ottawa, Feb. 11.—T. I. Church, Conservative member for Toronto, has given notice that he will ask the government to state whether it is its intention to carry out the capital commitments of the Grand Trunk Railway in various parts of Canada for any terminals and capital expenditures in various places as provided by the agreements made by this railway before it was absorbed into the National Railway system. Mr. Church also asks if the government is to provide money for the proposed grade separation at Detroit, and how much Canada will be expected to provide for the use of the Grand Trunk system of the new \$100,000,000 passenger terminals at Chicago.

Wants Trade Information. Several Questions dealing with foreign trade matters have been placed on the order paper of the Commons by Miss Agnes MacPhail, member for Southeast Grey. Miss MacPhail asks the government to state how many consuls and commercial agents the United States has resident in Canada; how many Canada has in the United States; and whether Canada intends to appoint sufficient agents in the United States to take care properly of her trade needs. Miss MacPhail is also asking what steps the government is taking to foster trade with the United Kingdom, and how many agents with technical trade knowledge are attached to the Canadian High Commissioner's office in London.
