A.92	By Mr. Morris regarding the loss of the money. He was asked if he knew anything about it and I can't quite remember just what took place or the words that were spoken. I can remember Mr. Morris asking the accused about his family and his home, where he lived how the accused went home.
Q.93	Now after these preliminary questions, what took place between the accused and Mr. Morris?
A.93	After that the accused admitted taking the purse from Mr. Wood's bed.
Q.94	And what about the contents of the purse?
A.94	I don know definitely what was in it.
Q.95	Did the accused refer to the contents?
A.95	I remember hearing him say that he took the money out of it and then put the purse and its other contents in the ash-can by the furnace.  He then said he had taken the money down town to some store in Kentville
Q.96	I show you exhibit "G" can you identify that?
A.96	I did not have it in my hand but the accused passed it to Mr. Morris.
