(Manitoba Free Press). The first act of violence since the C. P. R. strike was instituted in Winnipeg occurred at 10 o'clock last night when almost all the windows in two passenger coaches and several panes of glass in other cars were broken by stones hurled through them by un-known persons at St. Bonaface. The passenger train thus attacked was one which had been sent to the "Y" across the river to be turned, and the missiles motion on the return trip to Winnipeg. DUTCH MARINE MIRISTEN PREPARES FOR TROUBLE TRIP 16 DAYS NOW

Dr. John G. Leonard, Subsidized Mailboat Will Connect With Cut Short His Holidays Because of Venezuelan Situation-Another-Warskip For Scene of Trouble.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 14—Today the Japanese subsidized mail boat begins the weekly service between Snanghai and Dalny, connecting with South Manchurian and Siberian railways and making possible the Shanghai-London journey in sixteen days, against twenty-one via Vladivostok. It is hoped that shortly the service will be triweekly.

The Japanese ambition is to destroy the Vladivostok route. At the same time the costly Japanese subsidized steamship service on the Yangtse is losing money so heavily in face of the competition of the unaided British lines that it is believed it must eventually be abandoned.
