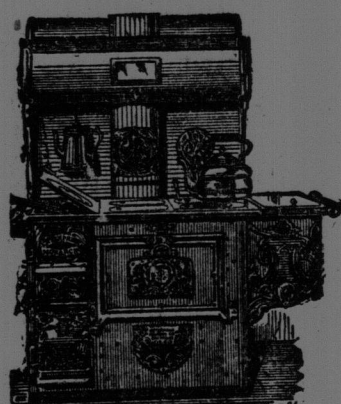

MORE EVIDENCE IN THE TANTARI CASE

Officials Tell of the Man's Violent Actions

But Members of the Britain's Crew Failed to Notice Anything Wrong—Mr. Taylor Speaks of Mr. McAlpine.

The case preferred against the C. P. R. by the immigration department for landing Matti Tantari, an insane immigrant, was resumed in the police court this morning. E. H. McAlpine, for the department, and F. R. Taylor for the C. P. R.

James V. Lantulum was recalled by Mr. McAlpine for the purpose of proving that he was appointed immigration agent. He produced two letters stating that he had been appointed, but Mr. Taylor objected and said that the order in council must be produced.

Dr. Ellis was called and testified that he noticed the man Tantari acting strangely as he approached the inspection line. He held the man as he thought him to be insane and on board the ship he was kept in a room with a broken electric light.

MALTA, April 18.—The battleships Swiftsure and Triumph have sailed from here, presumably for Turkish waters.

PARIS, April 18.—A special despatch received here from Constantinople says it is rumored there that Rehad Effendi, brother of the Sultan, and heir apparent to the throne, has left to join the Young Turks.

VIENNA, April 18.—The Neues Tagblatt Monester correspondent says it is reported that the Sultan is negotiating with the committee of Union and Progress with regard to his abdication.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., April 18.—Four men are reported killed on a wreck on the Grand Trunk near Berlin, Mich., this morning.

PETER HAIN'S DEFENCE WILL BE INSANTY

Counsel Will Try to Show That His Mind Was Upset by Stories Told of His Wife's Conduct.

PLUSHING, N. Y., April 18.—Insanity both at the time of the killing of Wm. E. Annis and since was expected to be the chief point in the defence in the trial beginning today of Captain Peter C. Hains, Jr., charged with the murder of Wm. E. Annis, on the boat of the Bay-side Yacht Club on August 15th last.

Counsel for the defense announced that they will attempt to prove that Captain Hains' mind was unbalanced by the stories of the friendship of Mrs. Hains by Annis. Whether or not Mrs. Claudia L. Hains, wife of the defendant, will be called as a witness for the prosecution was not certain and much depended on the decision on that point. Fifty witnesses were summoned for the defense.

One drunk was fined four dollars. Michael Costello, who was charged with stealing three oranges, valued at five cents, from a C. P. R. car at Sand Point, pleaded guilty and was remanded. He stated that he saw the car broken open. Some of the oranges were bad and he picked up three of them and put them in his pockets.

NOMINATIONS FOR THE BOARD OF REGENTS

S. D. Scott and W. B. Tennant Among Those Named

Sackville is to Have Civic Elections Tomorrow—Officers Chosen for the Athletic Association.

SACKVILLE, N. B., April 18.—Two St. John men, S. D. Scott and W. B. Tennant, have been nominated to fill vacancies which will be created this spring among representatives of the Alumni Society of Mount Allison Board of Regents.

Tomorrow sees civic election here. There will be two contests, one for the mayoralty, with Mayor Pickard and S. W. Cogg as opponents, the other in West Ward, where two aldermen are to be chosen from three candidates.
