PRESBYTERIAN

Accepts Call to Harve.
At a meeting of the Presbytery of Lunenburg and Greenwich, held on the 29th ult., Rev. J. F. McKay, of Clyde River and Barrington, N. S., accepted the call addressed to him from the congregation of Harve in the Presbytery of St. John. Mr. McKay's pastorate in his Nova Scotia congregation terminated August 9, and his induction to the pastoral charge of Harve will take place at an early date.

A Tour in Miramichi Presbytery.
The assembly's board of social service and evangelism has requested Mrs. Bertha Putnam to make a tour of Miramichi Presbytery in the interests of the board. A comprehensive itinerary plan has been outlined by the Presbytery's committee of which Rev. J. L. Jobb is convener. Beginning at New Mills on Sabbath last, Mrs. Putnam will visit every congregation within the bounds of the Presbytery, closing with Rexton on September 20. During the month of July she undertook similar work in the Presbytery of P. E. I. Her mission is of very great educational value, and has been highly appreciated in all parts of the church to which she has gone.

Several ministers from other parts of Canada have been taking advantage of the summer vacation season to make or renew acquaintances with personal friends and congregations in various sections of the maritime provinces. Notice has already been taken in this column of the visits of such men as Dr. Herdridge, moderator of the General Assembly, Dr. John Neil and Rev. John McNeill, of Toronto, who were each gladly welcomed to pulpits in the places of their visit. To these may be added the names of Rev. W. H. Sedgewick of Hamilton, Ont., who is visiting his home in Middle Musquodobi, N. S.; Rev. T. W. Taylor, of Toronto, who is spending a few weeks at Rexton, N. B., and who preached to an appreciative congregation in St. Paul's church there last Sabbath; Prof. Alex. Laird, of the Military College, Kingston, a native of Prince Edward Island, who is visiting different parts of his home province and Nova Scotia; Rev. M. A. Campbell, of First Presbyterian church, Montreal, who is announced to preach in St. David's church, St. John, for a couple of Sabbaths; and Rev. D. MacDermid, of Pembroke, Ont., who is to preach for a Sunday or two to his former congregation of St. John's church, Moncton during his visit.

Delayed by the War.
The European war has laid its disturbing hand upon almost every phase of social, commercial and political activity, even at this distance from the seat of conflict. Among the things it is now announced that the departure of several of our missionaries from the maritime provinces for their field of labor in Korea has been postponed. Revs. L. L. Young, D. W. McDonald and E. J. O. Fraser, with their wives, and Miss Edna Cruikshank were to sail from Vancouver on September 3, but as the British Admiralty has taken over the Pacific Empire boats their sailings have been postponed. It is hoped that they will be able to undertake the trip from Vancouver to Korea by way of Japan some time in October.

Eighty Years a Sunday School Teacher.
To be a teacher in the Sunday school continuously for eighty years is a distinction of a most unique character. It is doubtful if anywhere else in the world. Yet this is the story told in last week's Continent of Mrs. Anna M. Bruer, of the First Presbyterian church in Belvidere, New Jersey. U. S. A. Mrs. Bruer is ninety-two years of age, and began her service as a Sunday school teacher at the early age of twelve years. Mrs. Bruer's father was a lawyer of much distinction. Her first teacher was John McIntosh, afterwards president of Dean Theological Seminary. Her husband was a minister and also a minister. Rev. J. deHart Bruer, of whose church she is a loyal and helpful parishioner. She hears her son preach twice every Sunday, attends mid-week prayer meetings regularly and conducts, besides, each Sabbath day a Bible class for women, and a ten o'clock mission band for girls.

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GERMANS KILL 3,000 DEAD ON BATTLEFIELD AT HAELEN

Sacrificed their men without scruple—Fell in droves before fire of Belgian Gatling Guns—Report from Brussels says City is no longer in danger.

Brussels, Aug. 14 (via Paris, 12.35 a.m.)—The German casualties in the engagement at Haelen on Wednesday were 3,000 dead and wounded. The Germans, apparently, sacrificed their men without any scruple. During the fight the Germans were obliged to pass two bridges over the Gette and Vlema, where they were exposed to a heavy fire. The retreating Germans left piles of dead and wounded at those bridges. The same carnage occurred on the road from Threok to Haelen, where the German cavalry exposed to the gatling guns of the Belgians, fell in droves.

The German infantry and cavalry had a similar reception near Colfaek.

The success of the Belgian arms is considered particularly important here, as most of the Belgian troops participating had not been under fire before.

The Belgian casualties at Haelen were light indeed, as the troops were well entrenched, but many were wounded. The situation, which was somewhat critical on Tuesday morning, when the German patrols had arrived close to Brussels, was held to be rapidly improving from the stand point of the Belgians twenty-four hours later.

The victory described above was followed by new and successful engagements near Noville-Taviers and Echze, about nine miles north of Namur on Wednesday and Thursday. These operations proved that the Germans are retreating further and that the allies, being steadily reinforced, are resolutely pushing ahead.

Brussels is no longer in danger but the situation a few days ago was such that the eventuality of its occupation by the Germans was considered.

London, Aug. 14.—The Daily Mail's Brussels correspondent describes the engagement at Haelen as showing that the Belgians have passed another good test. He says that intermittent heavy guns was audible all morning.

This was punctuated about eleven o'clock by sharp detonations, as the Belgians blew up the bridges over the River Gette just in the nick of time. They were under shrapnel fire, and the German cavalry was just about to cross. With the bridges destroyed the fight resolved itself into an artillery duel, the shrapnel bursting, leaving a long trail of white smoke. In the meantime, a squadron of Mecklenburg dragoons, with rather reduced strength, attempted to penetrate the town of Diest at a gallop. About a mile from the town they dashed into a barricade of wagons lined by Belgian infantry. The Germans had

their revolvers drawn and charged directly at the barricade. The Belgians behind the barricade opened a murderous fire, and all the dragoons were either killed or captured. The Germans then tried to reduce resistance at this point by a cross fire from a battery, but after an interval ceased firing, and owing to similar repulse on other positions on their front withdrew in disorder, according to some accounts, to the other side of River Gette. Only two Belgians were wounded. In front of the barricade the Germans lay like a hedge of flesh.

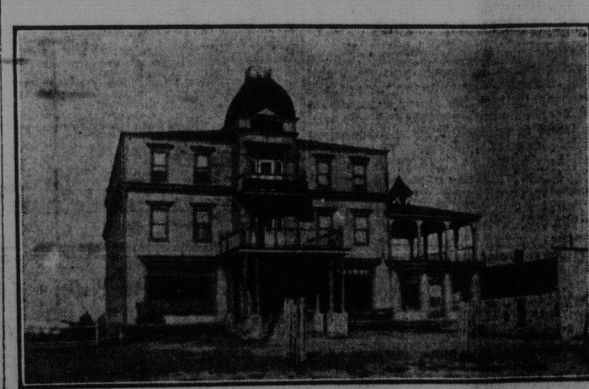
