DECISIVE VICTORY, PEACE WITHOUT INTRIGUE

FRANCO-RUSSIAN ALLIANCE PACIFIC IN PURPOSE, BUT ONCE IN FIGHT WILL STAY IN STRUGGLE UNTIL VICTORY COMPLETE

Paris, May 22.—in an address of welcome today to the visiting Russian officials at the Duma, Premier Briand said the Franco-Russian alliance never had had any purpose other than maintenance of peace and the stability of the European equilibrium. The premier asserted France and Russia had made a supreme effort to avoid a European war, and said the future could be regarded with confidence.

The peace which the Allies would demand, M. Briand continued, would be without intrigue, and it would come only after decisive victory which would ensure the world against a similar catastrophe in the future. He referred to the manner in which the defense of Verdun has been conducted, and expressed renewed faith in a final victory for France and her Allies.
