AUTONOMY FOR THE TERRITORIES.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Promises It if Elected

Premier Haultain Wrote Last May Setting Forth the Importance of Creating the Province and Suggested the Proposed Terms--Interesting Letters Passed.

Ottawa, Oct. 5. (Special)—The dominion government has decided to open negotiations with the Northwest Territorial government after the general election next over, with a view to giving provincial autonomy to the territories.

Mr. Haultain asked that legislation be introduced into parliament organizing upon the provincial basis that portion of the Northwest Territories lying between the western boundary of Manitoba and the eastern base of the Rocky Mountains.
