Constable J. D. (Dan) Palmer is presently serving at Resolute Bay Detachment, "G" Division... life on a P/V along B.C.'s beautiful coast was exchanged for the austere beauty of the high Arctic. He had previously served at Alert Bay and Mackenzie Detachments, both in "E" Division.

In the past decade Marine Services of the RCMP has evolved from the Marine Division of years ago and is now considered a "support service." As such, it may be the smallest and least known support service in the RCMP, but nonetheless a valuable entity of the Force with a tradition all its own.

Marine Division, as it was known from 1947, was dissolved approx-

imately ten years ago and today Marine Services is staffed by regular members of the Force who express a desire to work in the service. There are ten patrol vessels on strength; the majority of them serving on the West Coast, off British Columbia.

Although the operational costs of crewing and maintaining a vessel are high, the Force must maintain active policing in Canadian waters. Many P/V's (Patrol Vessels) are required to cover vast areas and perform various tasks. A few of the statutes that P/V personnel routinely enforce are: the Narcotic Control Act, the Canada Shipping Act and Small Vessel Regulations, and the Customs and Excise Act.
