IS YOUR NAME ON THE LIST?

The time for the expression of the popular will, otherwise the plebiscite, on the Ontario Temperance Act is approaching. The question of prime importance at present is whether or not your name is on the voters' list. As the list is posted in the offices of the municipal clerks, the information is easily ascertained. If you find your name missing in the list the next question is whether you are eligible for a vote. In a general way the qualification is as follows:

British citizenship, 21 years of age, residence in Canada for 12 months, residence in the municipality and not disqualified under the Election Act from voting at elections for the Legislative Assembly.

It will be noted that while twelve months' residence in Canada is required there is no time limit to residence in the municipality. If you are domiciled in the municipality at the time appointed by the judge for making complaint you are qualified in that respect.

Dates of sittings for hearing complaints or appeals in West Middlesex were announced in last week's Transcript. Appeals must be by notice in writing left with the clerk of the municipality. September 27th is the last day for entering appeals in the township of Moss and the villages of Wardville and Newbury, and September 29th for the township of Ekfrid and the village of Glencoe.

SHARE THE AMUSEMENT TAX

The method of selling amusement tax tickets adopted by the Ontario government is bringing protests from various parts of the province. It is not materially increasing the revenue of the province and it is making the handling of the business very unsatisfactory for the people who buy the tickets. Moreover the municipality is saddled with the expense of collecting the tax, which is decidedly unjust.

Mayor Jutton, of Hamilton, in speaking of the complaints made in that city, goes a step farther and urges that the municipalities where the amusement tax is collected should be entitled to a portion of it, and the same view is very widely held.

It was a tax imposed when the Ontario government was casting about for new sources of income. It took no account of the fact that the federal and municipal governments

were on the same ground looking for revenue.

The municipalities have limited methods of raising income while the legislature and the federal government have rights, or they assume them, and are able to place new taxes where they think they can secure revenue.

The amusement tax is a direct levy paid by the people of a municipality and the municipalities have a right to participate in it if it is to continue.

A surgical operation revealed in the stomach of a Saginaw, Mich., girl 1200 articles the weight of which was over three pounds. There was money to the amount of \$9.74, nineteen sewing machine bobbins eight of which were threaded, crucifixes, rosaries, medallions, shoe laces, open and closed safety pins, tinfoil, earrings, fragments of glass and crockery, rubber bands, keys, buttons, watch chains, nails, etc.

It is frequently said that the poor quality of the whiskey sold by bootleggers occasions a great deal more harm than would be done by "good whiskey." As to that, it is to be remarked that in the days when "good whiskey" was plentiful every hospital had its ward for delirium tremens patients, and every month or so one heard of severe cases. Today the disease is practically unknown. Every town also had its physical wrecks on the way to premature graves because of their addiction to drinking "good whiskey."

In Orillia we could always count half a dozen of them. It was from drinking from a bottle of "good whiskey" that a little lad of twelve or fourteen met his death in Orillia shortly before local option came into effect. It was "good whiskey" that was responsible for the fatalities from drowning, railway accidents and similar causes that were of frequent occurrence when the genuine article was readily available. The quality of the whiskey sold by the bootleggers today may not be as good as it used to be before the days of prohibition, but it does not seem to produce the same evil consequences.

FINE SCHOOL FAIR AT APPIN

Splendid Exhibits in all Departments, and Record Attendance

With a record attendance and some 800 exhibits in the various departments the annual school fair held at Appin on Friday, in which six public schools of the township of Ekfrid participated, will rank as one of the foremost events of this kind in the province. The exhibits were all of excellent quality, and the numerous entries in the various classes testified to the keen competition developed among the pupils of the several schools interested.

A spectacular feature of the fair and one which called forth much favorable comment was the school parade. In this S. S. No. 4 was awarded the Union Jack presented by the Women's Institute. The school represented Mother Goose and two-score nursery rhyme folk in the gay costumes of nursery rhyme days and looking as though they had just stepped down from the shelves of a very juvenile library. The characters were duplicated in order to follow the schedule of school parade. There was Mother Goose herself—a picturesque figure in her full black skirt, pointed cape and peaked hat. There was Old King Cole with his golden crown, and the Farmer in the Dell in his work-day attire. Red Riding Hood in her red cloak appeared not the least bit afraid of meeting her hereditary enemy, the wolf—for the Huntsman was there to protect her. There was Mary Quire Contrary displaying the flowers and tools of her garden rows. There was Simple Simon in his clown outfit and Boy Blue in his trig costume. There was Bo Peep with her little crook and broad-brimmed hat, and the Milkmaids with their pretty caps and shining pails. Jack Horner with his Christmas pie indicated no larder penury, although Old Mother Hubbard in her spectacles, bonnet and plumes was so near. Polly was there with her tea kettle, and Miss Muffet with her curds and whey. Jack and Jill were there, and sure enough! Jack fell down. Yankee Doodle was captivating with his high silk hat, striped trousers and gay stars. Little girls in nurses' costumes hushing their dollies were there, and Baby Buntings in their pretty, long, white dresses and baby bonnets. And say!
