Will Not Split either side. Toronto, April 7 In announcing the Government's temperance proposals n the House this afternoon. Premier Hearst said it is the intention of the Government's temperance Act and the other entitled "The Temper-nee Referendum Act 1919" These have not been finally drafted by the law elerk but will be brought down in the House this week. The amendments to the Ontario Temperance Act proper are designed to assist the enforcement of the act, the premier explained and the principal clause will be that doing away with existing vendors and giving the Gov-ernment control of all liquor sold under the act. An announcement of this policy was made some time ago. The working out of the policy will be in the hands of the license depart ment which will maintain a chief or-head office in Toronto a central ware house, or warehouses, for receipt of liquor in wholesale quantities and for various municipalities throughout the province. The head office shall have control of the taking over of the stocks now owned by licensed vendors. the puying of liquors and determination of prices at which the same shall be re-sold. So much for the temporary policy.


