ARE PRIZE WINNERS

Ponies of Mr. John Lloyd-Jones Are
Showing Real Class at Big
Exhibition.

The Welsh pony, Grybright, ex-
hibited by Mr. W. T. Meny of Oak-
ville, Ont., and won first in saddle
class under 12 hands, was bred by
John Lloyd-Jones, Burford. Mr.
Lloyd-Jones has sold Mr Meny a full
brother, Starlight 2nd, to the win-
ning pony. The great grandsire of
these ponies was champion of Eng-
land and was sold for over \$5,000.

Lloyd-Jones Bros. have a pure
white pony foal which is considered
very valuable. The imported Welsh
stallion, Daylight, has been twice
champion at Toronto and also won
first at the Toronto show sixth No-
vember last, is the son of Mr. Meny's
pony. This dam was imported and
their grand dam also. The grand dam
was the fastest Welsh pony in
Shropshire and made a record of 13
miles in 57 minutes, including three
stops. She trotted the entire distance
and was officially timed.

PORT DOVER, May 11.--Actions

were settled Saturday, the town pay-
ing \$3,700, and the park proprietors

bridge, which gave way under the
strain.
