

"FOOT SLED" WARRIORS

NORWEGIAN SOLDIERS MARCH FAST ON THEIR SKEES.

wift-Footed Infant-ymen of Norway Put Them to Good Use in Their Winter Manoeuvres - A Summer Army on Bloycles Can Hardly Get Away Faster Than These Novely-

The Japanese and Russians have introduced many up to date and novel methods of fighting in the course of the conflict in Manchuria, but they seem to have overlooked the value of the skee, the "foot sled" which the Norwegian soldiers put to such good use in winter manoeuvres. If an army from another/European country should attempt to invade Norway in the winter



its soldiers would have a hard time catching the Norwegian warriors in case the latter decided on retreat. An army mounted on bleycles could hardly get away faster over an erdinary road in the summer time than the Norwegian sixee infantry could in case of necessity. Wings could scarcely ald them to make a swifter flight. On feet sleds they can travel eight miles an hour, or seventy miles a day. There is record of a race in which a runner on skees made 140 miles in twenty-two hours, rests included.

The skee tournaments in the leading Norwegian and Swedish cities are the leading sporting events of those countries, and the hardy Scandinavians have grown so accustomed to the use of the skee that it has been adopted as a part of a soldier's equipment. Scandinavian infantrymen often engage in military manoeuvres in which while wearing the skee they go through the usual exercises of a military drill. To the ordinary soldier this would be quite difficult, for the skee infantrymen wear goat hair socks in place of NORWEGIAN SKEE INFANTRYMEN AT DRILL

quite difficult, for the skee is not an easy thing to wear. The skee infantrymen wear goat hair socks in place of shees and when they go into camp take off the skees and put on boots. They travel in light marching order when on a military expedition in the winter time. When they are not using the skees the soldiers stick them up in the snow near their tents.


