CRIMPING IN QUEBEC.

Michael Huck, better known as Michael "Huck, better known as Mick, was a prominent member of the rimiping profession, well-known to the police of old Quebcc fifty years ago. Not a vicious man, for a crimp, he carried or a large business, and his ready tongue never failed him., Like his confreres, he got joul of the law occasionally, but not to any great extent. In the few records, left by the late Chiof Trude, of the water police, his name graces the entries, as a suspect, but in the wind, up, he almost invariably comes out, ahead. "Found no saalors," is the usual conclusion of the raid. Just how, he squared himself, is hard to say, for his erpno ium was generally well-filled during the shipping season, especially by foreign seamen, of whom he had the monopoly, but he isanged, to get clear, in a surprising namer.

Hyck had a sense of humor, too, eep and fine, as one of his transacons abundantly proves. A ship new-y arrived contained a crew, ready to espend to his solicitations to derespond to his solicitations to desert, but only upon the promise that they would be sent to Chicago, where wages for lake mariners were, at the time, high, and alluring. He readily made the required promise, and carried it out, by shipping them while dazed by liquor, upon a ship bound for Liverpool, so salving his conscience and gratifying his friends by ience and gratifying his friends by a display of wit, at the same time by inserting in the shipping papers as to destination, Chicago, via Liv-

erpool.

If the apologists of this illicit trade could have at any time discovered one redeeming feature, they certainly failed to, and were silent on the subject, as the feverish days of the subject, as the leverish days of stilpping from 1850 and onward pro-duced a system of terrorism, such as shocked society. The knife was buse ily at work, and above the yells of combat, which issued constantly from the alenas in which the seamen fought, the cry of murder was too of-ten plainly heard. Many were torn from the decks of ships by hired from the decks of ships by hired gangs of ruffians and driven, like sheep into these haunts of infamy. Even mates were shanghaied, and shipped as common sailors, in spite of their appeals and protests. To supply a waiting ship and secure an advance note, kidnapping in open day was not uncommon. Making his way to shore, he was hidden by the fraternity so cleverly, that the police never discovered his place of ually made his escape dressed as a concealment, and the murderer eventconcealment, and the murderer eventually made his excare dressed as

woman.

In fact the crimp himself has disappeared from his old haunts beneath the grity cliffs of Quebec, and he has no successors. One alone of those who carried on that terrible trade is still alive, doing a quiet sailor boarding house business in a small way, a survival of a past in which he bore a part himself, but of better repute than his associates.
