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he that reapeth receiveth wages, and gathereth fruit unto life eternal; that both he that soweth and he that reapeth may rejoice together."

While singing "Lord thou lovest a cheerful giver," the collection was taken up.

On motion of Hon. D. McCurdy, seconded by P. P. Archibald, Esq., the officers for 1882 were elected unanimously. [For list of officers see page 3].

After singing "Lord dismiss us," Rev. J. F. Avery pronounced the benediction and brought to a close one of the most profitable and interesting meetings which the Society has ever held.
