MORE IMPORTATIONS TO BE MADE TO MEET DEMANDS.

MARK TWAIN AND SPELLING REFORM.

Mark Twain was a guest at the Associated Press banquet, and made an extremely funny speech on the simplified spelling campaign. He said in part:—"Let us look at this mighty question reasonably, rationally, sanely—yes, and calmly, not excitedly. What is the real function, the essential function, the supreme function of language? Isn't it merely to convey ideas and emotions? Certainly. can we? Yes.
"I hold in my hand the proof of it. Here is a letter written by a woman right out of her heart of hearts. I think she never saw a spelling book in her life. The spelling is her own.

It reduces the fonetics to the last gasp—it squeezes the surplusage out of every word—there's no spelling that can begin to compare with it on this planet outside of the White House. And as far the punctuation, there isn't any. It is all one sentence eagerly and breathlesly uttered, without break or pause in it anywhere. The letter is absolutely genuine-I have the proofs of that in my possession. I can't stop to spell the words for you, but you can take the letter presently and comfort your eyes with it. Here it is:


