the same type. The tenders of Cammell, Laird and Co. for Canada were £400,000 for cruisers and £110,000 for destroyers. The British Admiralty received tenders at the same time which placed the price of cruisers at £200,000 and for destroyers at £250,000. This increased price for building cruisers in Canada was 43 per cent for cruisers and 38 per cent for destroyers. The cost in both cases covered hull and machinery. In Great Britain there was an addition of £54,000 to the cruisers for reserve guns, naval apparatus, etc., bringing the total cost of cruisers for Britain to £254,000.

To the Canadian prices there had to be added for the same purpose £64,000 making a total cost of £264,500 for cruisers or 39 per cent above the British price. To the cost of destroyers there was added in the same way in Britain £14,000 and £16,800 in Canada, making the total cost of destroyers in Britain £100,000 and in Canada £135,800, an increase for Canada of 37 per cent.

### Teachers' Lecture.

Prof. S. B. McCready of the O.A.C., Guelph, and a director of elementary agricultural education for Ontario, is to speak to the teachers and trustees of the rural schools in the court house Tuesday afternoon. His lecture will be on the subject of "School Gardening and Kindred Work."

### Gas Well Struck.

Mr. Dennis, field manager of the Standard Gas Company, when seen at the court house this morning, stated he struck a large well of 180-pound rock pressure on the farm of Russell Manning, Onondaga township.
