

Sole Survivor Dead

HAMILTON, Ont., April 19 .ohn Connelly, sole survivor of a grim tragedy on the bay away back in 1871, died at the Asylum here yes terday. Connelly with five other boys was skating across the bay. One of the lads turned back and went through an air hole. He was found there later held up by his hair which was frozen to the ice. On the return trip the other four also went into the same hole, three of them were drown ed. Connelly had a narrow escape The tragedy wore on his mind until he lost his reason, and had to be placed in the Asylum. Leaves for America.


