The remains were sent to Bridgeburg, where the unfortunate man left a wife and three children.

Sole Survivor Dead.—HAMILTON, Ont., April 19.—John Connelly, sole survivor of a grim tragedy on the bay away back in 1871, died at the Asylum here yesterday. Connelly with five other boys was skating across the bay. One of the lads turned back and went through an air hole. He was found there later held up by his hair which was frozen to the ice. On the return trip the other four also went into the same hole; three of them were drowned. Connelly had a narrow escape. The tragedy wore on his mind until he lost his reason, and had to be placed in the Asylum.

Leaves for America.—LONDON, April 19.—Sir Cecil Arthur Spring-Rice, the new British ambassador to the United States in succession to James Bryce left London to-day for Liverpool to sail for New York on board the Carmania. He told the Canadian Press before his departure: "I am going to assume the duties of my office as British ambassador immediately on my arrival at Washington. My family will come later." The staff of the United States embassy, Lady Pauncefoot and the Duke of Devonshire were at the railway station to take farewell of the ambassador.
