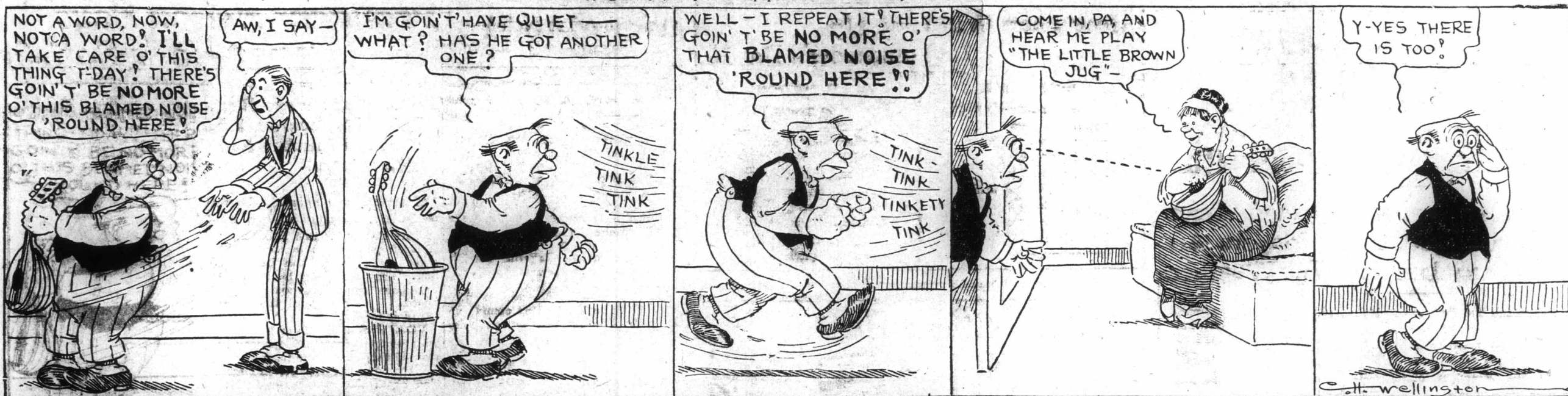

HOME RULE CONFERENCES ARE RESUMED

Asquith, Churchill, Carson and Law at Meeting—Redmond Not There

LONDON, May 6.—The conversations between the members of the Government and the Irish leaders in reference to a settlement of the Home Rule question, which were expected to follow the conciliatory speeches in the House of Commons on April 29, have apparently begun. It is reported that Premier Asquith, First Lord of the Admiralty, Winston Churchill, Bonar Law, leader of the Unionists, and Sir Edward Carson, leader of the Ulster Unionists, met privately to-day. The Irish Nationalists were not represented at the meeting. The reports in circulation alternately ascribe their absence to their unwillingness to participate in such a conference lest their followers should construe their presence as a sign that they had weakened, or to their ignorance of the Government's action.

Replying to a question on the Home Rule settlement in the House of Commons, Premier Asquith said the Government was taking steps which seemed to him to be most likely to conduce to a possible settlement. He added that the House of Commons would ultimately have control of the matter.

The members of Parliament are largely engrossed just now with the Irish difficulty. Seventy Liberals and sixty Unionists have signed a memorial to the Government welcoming a solution of the question through federation of the Kingdom. It is expected that many others will sign the memorial.

One hundred Unionists who are opposed to any compromise on the Irish question met to-day, and adopted a resolution to oppose to the utmost the adoption of Home Rule in any form.

THIRTEEN WERE SAVED—ONE BOAT STILL MISSING

Further Details Today of the Mysterious Burning Ship of the Atlantic.

SABLE ISLAND, N. S., May 6.—Captain McDonald and thirteen members of the crew of the British Steamer Columbian burned at sea were saved by the Steamer Manhattan. A wireless despatch to this effect was received from the Manhattan by the Marconi station here early to-day. The Manhattan, bound from New York for Antwerp, had been near the scene of the burning of the Columbian for some hours and was known to be searching for boats containing members of the Columbian's crew. Her success was announced in the following message:

"Manhattan picked up one boat of Columbian, captain and thirteen others. One engineer killed in explosion and one man drowned leaving ship. Manhattan still searching for other boat."

The rescue, it was added, was made early in the morning in 41.19 north latitude and 59.35 west longitude.

Yesterday the Cunard Liner Franconia picked up one of the Columbian's boats containing thirteen men and the body of Chief Steward Matthews so that 27 in all have been rescued alive. The other missing boat, for which the Manhattan and other steamers are still searching, contains the first and second officers and 17 men.

The steamer Columbian, bound from Antwerp for New York, caught fire at sea Sunday night. According to the wireless advices from the Franconia, which rescued the first boat of survivors, the flames spread quickly and were followed by explosions which necessitated the hasty abandoning of the steamer by the crew. The men got away in three boats, but in their haste were illy prepared for a battle with the seas in open boats. The first survivors when picked up for 36 hours and suffered severely. Captain McDonald's boat, picked up early to-day by the Manhattan was adrift for more than fifty hours before help reached them.

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CRICKET IN THE OLD COUNTRY

First Games of the Season Were Ended on Tuesday.

NEW YORK, May 6.—A London cable to The Tribune says: The opening of the county cricket season took place last Saturday with only four of the counties engaged. They ended their first games yesterday.

Leicester opposed Essex for their first match at the county ground, Leicester, and began the season in brilliant style with a fine win by 259 runs. Leicester was nineteen runs behind on the first inning, but at their second attempt ran up the big score of 387, to which C. J. B. Wood and Coe contributed 120 and 116, respectively.

The Essex men were set with 369 to win, but came to grief before the Leicester bowlers and were all dismissed for 129.

The scores follow: Leicestershire, 124 and 387; Essex 143 and 129.

Surrey entered upon the first game of the season at Kennington oval against Northampton and made a bad start in the championship games, losing by 164 runs. With a lead of 140 on the first innings, Northampton gave a fine display at the second attempt and running up 287 for five wickets declared, left Surrey with 428 to win.

Although giving a better show than in their first innings they were put out for 263. C. N. Wolley just missed the century for Northampton, making a brilliant 92. The score follows: Northamptonshire 297 and 287 for 5 wickets, declared; Surrey 157 and 263.

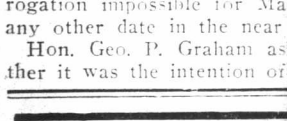
