ported Pletier J. Troelstra's demand

that the queen abdicate. Queen Wil-

helmina decided to comply, but the

garrison afterwards laid down its

arms in the presence of loyal troops

from the provinces.

**ALLIED ENVOYS**

London Times Thinks Huns

Will Try to Start Trouble

Over "Freedom of Seas"

London, Nov. 20.—The Times to-

day says:

"It seems obvious that during the

discussions of peace Germany will

attempt to concentrate attention on

the 'freedom of the seas,' as the

most promising matter about which

there might be a difference of opin-

ion among the allies. Indeed, one may

find almost any German newspaper

indulging in the argument that Ger-

many may hope to profit by differ-

ence of opinion prevailing in Eng-

land and America. But," says the

Times, "this course on Germany's

part is uncertain."

A Hamburg View

An article in the Hamburger Nach-

richten says that the British press is

fully awake to German attempts to

exploit the Anglo-American rivalry

in shipping. The article argues that

the real point at issue is whether

Germany can resist the demand for

the confiscation of German shipping

to replace the volume of British ton-

nage sunk.

The Hamburg article concluded:

"It is clear that the more privi-

leging the conditions forced up-

on the German empire are the more

probable will it be that a decisive

British alienation from the United

States will not arise."

It is suggested that this article

may have been one of the last efforts

of the late Albert Ballin.

Other Freedoms
