FRANCE NOT AFRAID.

A special cable despatch to the New York Herald carries the information that there is still no sign of the opening of a sustained German offensive on the western front, and the author of the despatch doubts very much that any such offensive will be attempted.
In this view he is supported, he says, by several military experts who are in close touch with the situation in the west and who believe that the much advertised offensive will get not much farther than the ravings of the German press.

The Herald's correspondent points out, however, that other military experts, including, he thinks, the Allied generals in command on the western front, are of opinion that the German military chiefs, even if they wanted to, cannot avoid making a desperate attempt to break through the Anglo-French lines at some point between Verdun and the Channel coast. The enemy leaders, these critics say, have been caught in their own trap. In order to convince the German people, and spur on the armies on the battle line they have boasted loudly of their plans for the spring—plans for victory and plunder; and any failure to make a drive before the summer would in the opinion of these writers be met by "revulsion, despair and disappointment," serious enough to shake the German throne and break completely the prestige of the military clan.

The correspondent goes on to say that no matter what the plans of the Germans may be, the enemy will not catch the Anglo-French commanders napping. France and Great Britain are ready for any drive that may be attempted. In fact, he thinks, the armies are eager for it. They are confident that not only can they hold their own lines but that can inflict terrible punishment on the enemy. Nobody in France, he adds, is frightened by the loud beating of the German drum.

FEBRUARY WEATHER.

Feb. has been a cold month, the thermometer registering below zero 10 days during the month. The mean temperature was 17.479 degrees as compared with 18.33, 18.77, 25.61 and 14.19 for corresponding months in 1917, 1916, 1915 and 1914 respectively.

A thaw on the 13th and 15th took off considerable snow but enough remained for good sleighing. Roads continued very icy until the 20th when another thaw with .60 inches of rain took off more of the snow and ice. This was followed by cold weather and then a heavy rain on the 26th of 1.15 inches, which caused much flooding and removed most of the snow, making it necessary to use wheel vehicles. The balance of the month was fairly mild.

There was little snow during the month, 11 3-4 inches being the aggregate and this fell on six different dates. The month on the whole has been fairly bright 103.3 hours of sunshine being recorded.

OBITUARY.

MAJOR W. E. OUTHIT.

Major William E. Outhit died at the N. S. Sanatorium on Sunday afternoon. He had been ill for several months and death followed a violent hemorrhage. He was widely known as one of the leaders of the Cadet Corps movements in Canada. Major Outhit was forty-five years of age and was the son of Thomas Outhit of Melvern Square, Annapolis County, where he was born. Mr. J. F. Outhit, Barrister of Kentville is a brother of the deceased. He was prominently identified with the organization of the Cadet Corps in Nova Scotia and was for several years Superintendent in this Province. Five years ago he was transferred to Calgary as Superintendent of Cadet Corps in the Province until, nine months ago, failing health compelled him to retire. He returned to Kentville where he entered the Sanatorium for treatment.

Major Outhit was a graduate of Dalhousie University, from which he received the degree of Bachelor of Arts in 1899 and a year later was awarded the M. A. degree. He also had received the Ph. D. degree from American universities. Major Outhit was a very efficient officer, and gave inspiring leadership to the Cadets under his direction. He was a student and a lover of good literature, was exceedingly well informed on economic and political questions and wielded a ready and vigorous pen, having on occasion contributed interesting letters to daily and other papers. Major Outhit was a young man of high character and bright promise and many friends throughout Canada will regret to hear of his early death. While residing at Kentville he made a large number of friends.

The remains were taken to Melvern Square, Monday, accompanied by Mr. J. F. Outhit and burial took place there.
