How Bader Powell Foiled the Last Book Attack

t Maf king-The Assaultin Surrender After Losing Heavily.

London, May 22.-Lord Roberts re-ports to the War Office that he has London, May 22.—Lord Roberts reports to the War Office that he has received a report from Col. Baden-Powell, dated May 13, giving important news. Before dawn May 13, a storming party, 250 strong, personally led by Eloff, rushed the pickets and reached the Staat and Protectorate camp from the westward, along the Maloppe Valley, a strong musketry demonstration being made at the same time along the eastern front of our position. Our western posts closed in and stopped the Boer supports following, thus cutting off Eloff's retreat, while the town defences stopped his further advance. His force got got divided in the darkness, and a strong party was placed between them, completely surrounding them. Fighting continued all day long. Soon after nightfall the two parties surrendered and the other was driven out of the Staat under a heavy fire.

fire. Ten dead and nineteen wounded of the enemy were left behind and 108 prisoners were taken, including Eloff and nine officers. Swenteen Frenchmen and many Germans were among the prisoners. Our losses were six men killed and two officers and nine men wounded.
