Ottawa, March 16.—The Customs returns for the month of February show a continued increase in the revenue of imports and exports. The Customs duties for the month of February totalled \$4,295,297, an increase of \$802,349 over the corresponding month last year. As compared with 1905-06 the Customs duties for the first eight months of the present fiscal year have increased by \$4,627,-029. The imports for the eight months increased by \$36,402,844, and the exports by \$2,555,013.

PHODES SCHOLARSHIPS

Canadian Wins Highest Distinction Open to Under Grads. At Oxford.

A statement in reference to the operations of the Rhodes scholarship scheme has been issued. From this it appears that there are now in residence at Oxford under the Rhodes bequest 161 scholars drawn from the different countries for which scholarships are provided. Seventy-one come from the British colonies, seventy-nine from the United States, and eleven from Germany. Candidates are subjected to examination tests which ensure their acceptance at Oxford, but the final selection of scholars is in all cases left to local committees of selection, guided in their choice by the suggestions made in the will of Mr. Rhodes. The scholars are distributed among twenty of the Oxford colleges. Open to Under Grads. At Oxford.

Only a few men, it appears, have as yet reached the final stage of their work at Oxford, but among the distinctions won during the past year by Rhodes schelars are the following:


How to Furnish a Pincushion Stall at

a Bazaar.

It is almost time for the annual breaking out of the bazaar epidemic, which attacks all communities, whether in town or country, in the fall. Lots of women dread these visitations not only on account of the trouble they entail. but from the fear of presiding over a:
"stall" that is not (to use a commercial;
ism) a "good seller." All doubt on thisism) a good seller." All doubt on this-score may be set at rest if a pincushiona stall be selected. It may be safely/ looked upon as a "draw." The stock in-trade is neither expensive nor troublesome to provide, and any surplus there may be need never remain long on hand, for a pincushion can claim to rank as a necessary of life.

The object with bazaar stock is first

to be equipped with a sufficient supply of novelties and even addition to make



pincushion suggestions may certainly be termed novelties in their line:

It is the fashion now to have monster pincushions that reach from side to side of the dressing table and hold not only the supply of ordinary lace pins, safety pins, etc., which are in this manner best marshaled for a choice. The cushion is bolster shaped and rests on a semicircular wooden support. The ends are gathered into off with ribbon streamers, each ter-minating in a colored glass bead. This

idea admits of many variations.

Very quaint and unusual is the Dutch pincushion, copied exactly from one used in the land of dikes and windmills. This pretty article stands about six inches high, although it may be made of any size. The framework is formed of eight pieces of cardboard covered with silk and neatly sewed toin hourglass shape. section of silk covered cardboard is



BOLSTER CUSHION. sewed at the bottom, and the case is filled with bran or cotton batting tightly packed. A bran stuffed cushion is deftly fitted into the top, and the whole is finished down the seams with fine ord. A waistband, as it were, is put around the center of the cushion. Old fashioned blue and white checkerboard silk is the quaintest material to use, with the top cushion of a harmon

that fits her. After obtaining the pattern it is so good thing to cut out a muslin waist. For joy and pleasure there will be, Thus one can be sure that the pattern its. Shoe Mag That Is Practical. A practical shoe bag is made in the following simple way: Cut a strip of heavy cretonne or denim twenty-eightchiches long by fifteen inches wide. Attach to this a strip the same length; but only twelve inches wide, having first-bound one of the long sides with colored tape.

Bind the other edges in with those of the longer piece, except at the top, us-ing the same tape. Divide the upper and shorter strip into pockets the right size for shoes, using tape to mark them. and stitch on the sewing machine. Thismay have a short flap at the top to-quite cover the shoes from dust. Thisbag, when fastened to the inner side of the closet door, is quite out of the way and at the same time easily within reach. Under this large bag might hang a small one made in the same fashion, in which to keep the boxes of shoe paste, ciothes for cleaning and brushes for polishing.
