IT LOOKS OMINOUS

Britain's Ships Active on the Confines of Turkey.

Athens, May 10.—The British fleet, consisting of twenty-one warships, is lying at Piræus with steamers up. They will be further augmented to-day by the arrival of the second cruiser squadron commanded by Rear Admiral Prince Louis of Battenberg.

Suez, Egypt, May 10.—A strong patrol of Egyptian coast guards, with five guns, has proceeded to the eastern side of the canal.

Longshoremen Strike Settled.
Cleveland, May 10.—Following conferences between President Keefe of the Longshoremen's Union and allied labor interests and representatives of the dock managers' commission, announced last night that the strike of the longshoremen on the lakes has been settled. The men will go back to work on the basis of last season's wages, pending another conference. The strike involved fully 20,000 men employed on the great lakes.

"White Cap" Gang Rounded Up.
Jackson, Mich., May 10.—Over 200 citizens of Franklin County, charged with being members of an alleged "White Cap" organization, pleaded guilty to the charge of intimidating the Government homesteaders, and were each assessed the minimum fine of \$25 and three months' imprisonment. The imprisonment was held up pending good behavior. Among those indicted was the sheriff of Franklin County.

TO BE NO REPEAL

Indemnity and Pension Bill of Last Session Stands.

Ottawa, May 10.—Mr. Armstrong resumed the debate on W. F. Maclean's bill to repeal the indemnity and pension bill of last session, and after an all-night debate, the House divided at 2 o'clock this morning when the motion was lost on a vote of 9 to 167. Those voting for Mr. Maclean's bill were: Barr, Blain, Christie, Elston, Lalor, W. F. Maclean, McIntyre (Perth), Walsh and Wilson (Lennox and Addington).

Earlier in the day, Mr. R. L. Borden read Hon. Frank Oliver a lecture on his bulking returns ordered with immaterial matter and his refusal to permit members of Parliament to inspect the files of the department, whereupon Sir Wilfrid Laurier gave utterance to the astounding doctrine that the Government could decide whether or not it was advisable to produce any particular returns as the House had no inherent right to compel their production.

The House passed the resolution introduced by Dr. Stockton (St. John), providing for a committee of seven to report upon the sale of fraudulent or deleterious medicines in Canada and the advertisements thereof.

A discussion took place on the resolution requesting the Imperial Parliament to pass legislation making it an offence to make false representations to induce or deter emigration to Canada, especially in regard to condition of the labor market.

To Summon Whole Legislature.
Boston, May 10.—District Attorney Moran yesterday announced his intention of summoning before the grand jury the entire membership of the Massachusetts Legislature in connection with charges of bribery recently made over the defeat of the anti-bucket shop bill in the House of Representatives. Already summonses have been issued for seventy-five members of the general court.

Miss Julia O'Flynn Passes Away at the Home of Her Sister Mrs. McDonald

Miss Julia O'Flynn, an old and respected resident of this city, passed away this morning at the home of her sister, Mrs. Augustine McDonald, Queen St., in her 60th year.

The deceased had been confined to her bed with a serious illness for five months and her death was not unexpected. She was the daughter of the late Patrick and Ellen O'Flynn, of this city, who died five years ago, the father's demise following that of his aged partner only three weeks later.

Miss O'Flynn was a devout and self-sacrificing woman and for ten years she was engaged in nursing her invalid mother, who, for many years, was confined to her bed, and in taking care of her father.

She was a member of St. Joseph's church congregation and took an active interest in church matters up to the time of her mother's illness. She was loved and esteemed by all who knew her and her life was characterized by her love and devotion to her parents.

Her many friends and admirers in this part of the country will regret her death, which removes one of Chatham's noblest citizens from the community.

Besides her sister in this city the deceased leaves three brothers and five sisters, all married, and residents of other towns, to mourn her loss. The funeral will take place Saturday morning at ten o'clock to St. Joseph's church.
