Instructive Lectures.

The lecture by Rev. H. F. Waring on Friday evening under the auspices of the Athenaeum Society, was a rich treat. The subject of the lecture was 'The Bible and Modern Science.' The audience listened attentively to a very able discussion of an intensely interesting question. The main idea of the speaker was that the home is the centre of national life, and that the purification of national life must have its beginning in the purification of the lives of the individuals who compose the nation. The lecture was most helpful and interesting. Rev. Mr. Waring will always be heard with pleasure by a Wolfville audience.

During the past week the people of Wolfville were favored with two lectures by the Rev. Dr. Hore, President of Newton Theological Seminary. The first lecture was given in College Hall, Sunday afternoon and was enjoyed by a large audience. The subject was 'The Bible and Modern Thought.' Dr. Hore showed that the force of the 'law of development' was not understood or felt until the year 1870. Since that time the so-called critics of the Bible have gone on with their labors and the results to-day can be fairly well estimated. At the most their work has been one of refining. The relative value of different parts of the scriptures has been ascertained. The great result has been to bring to the front the supreme place of Jesus in the revelation of God.

The lecturer spoke again on Monday evening. Subject: Things Worth While. Life and what it should mean was the real subject. Our values are often false. The race for Fame, Power or Wealth as ends in themselves was condemned. Dr. Hore is a logical reasoner. His sentences are short and powerful. He makes no attempt to capture his audience with any oratorical skill. Instead he appeals to the judgment. He speaks to the mind and trusts his audience to follow him. The calm assurance with which he speaks carries conviction with it. None who heard him could fail to be impressed with his sincerity.

The bountiful snow-fall during the first part of this week has made good sleighing.
