"No person, firm or company 'shall, without the consent of the 'Licensee in writing first had and 'cbtained, cut on any lands 'licensed, for timber for the building of any vessel of over '100 tons gross tonnage, or know-'ingly use for the building of such 'vessel any timber so cut. Every person, firm or company commit-'ting a breach of this section shall "be subject to a penalty not ex-'ceeding One Thousand Dollars which may be recovered in a sum-"mary manner before a Stipendiary Magistrate at the suit of 'the Licensee."

MINING LICENSES.

"The period of twelve months for which a License of Minerals may be granted shall be com-'puted so as to include the day of "the date of such License and "shall expire at midnight on the 'same day of the same month in "the following year, and a new 'License for the said Minerals "may be applied for and granted "at or after the hour of ten "o'clock of the forenoon of the "next lawful day after such ex-J.
