TREATY WILL BE PRESENTED IF ITALIANS ABSENT

Peace Conference Will Go Ahead with Peace Treaty Without Regard to Any Action of Italy.

Paris, April 30. (Associated Press).—It is planned in Peace Conference circles to go ahead with the treaty of peace without regard to any action by Italy, as it is considered probable the Italian delegation will not return, certainly not within the present week. The delivery of the treaty and the first exchanges with the Germans, therefore, will occur without the participation of Italy, and it is stated that this procedure will go forward steadily up to the signing of the treaty.

The first meeting with the Germans probably will take place Friday afternoon or Saturday, when the pact will be presented. A day or two will be given for questions concerning interpretation of different phases of the convention, without, however, involving a prolonged discussion. The French view is that the Germans may ask for two weeks' delay to permit them to return to Weimar, with an additional week for discussion of the points presented after their return from the temporary German capital. This is a matter of conjecture however, as there is no precise information as to Germany's intentions.

Reports from Berlin are somewhat contradictory concerning Germany's purposes, as some reports indicate that an early signing of the peace treaty is probable, while others say it is doubtful whether the pact will be signed at all. These reports coming from different sources indicate a lack of concerted attitude as to the treaty and show there is a disposition to leave the decision largely with the German envoys who are now at Versailles.

Versailles, April 30.—When the German delegation to the Peace Congress, headed by Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau, reached Versailles last night it was received in the name of the French Government by M. Chailers, Prefect of the Department of Seine-et-Oise, to whom the Count expressed thanks on behalf of the delegation. The Count's secretary, Herr Rudiger, remarked to the newspapermen: "Words fail me to describe my feelings as I crossed your devastated regions. I hope the peace, which we are about to sign will give satisfaction to all the nations."

Responsibility of Hohenzollerns
Paris, April 30. (Associated Press).—Doubt has arisen whether the responsibility of the former German Kaiser will be included in the peace treaty owing to the failure of the plenary session to take action on the report of the Council of Three recommending his prosecution which was on the order paper on Monday. Parliamentarians say that the Council might still include its report in the treaty, but the subject is one on which a plenary session of the Conference ordered the report, inaction on the report prevents its inclusion in the treaty unless the expected secret plenary session of the Conference directs further action.

TREATY PRESENTED AT THE SECOND SESSION

Versailles, April 30.—The first session of the Peace Congress will be held in the room which has been used by the Supreme War Council and will be devoted to a verification of credentials. The text of the peace treaty will be presented to the Germans at the second session in the dining-room of the Hotel Trianon. This is a superb apartment, seventy-five feet square and having windows almost entirely around three sides, making it virtually a room enclosed in glass.

The delegates will proceed to the conference chamber through a marble corridor lined with mirrors on one side and opening on a park from the other.

Amsterdam, April 30.—The international Socialist Conference at Arnheim has adopted a resolution opposing any peace in contradiction of President Wilson's fourteen points. The organization will send its executive committee to Paris to demand an interview with the Council of Four and will insist upon the necessity of a solution in conformity with the decisions of the Berne Socialist Conference.

Many women's organizations have promised their support to the Canadian Trade Commission's campaign to "Buy Canadian-made Goods" only, if possible.

The value of the British trade preference to goods from within the Empire, now actually working, means millions of dollars to Canada. "The Canadian public apparently have not grasped the significance of this yet," is one statement made to the Canadian Trade Commission.

Credits of \$75,000,000 have been established in Europe by Canada and \$25,000,000, more is likely, but according to the G. T. C., this only touches the fringe of the world-wide trade openings.

The big amateur boxing contest to be staged by the Western Pastime Club on May 10th is an assured success as far as the entry list is concerned for word was received by long distance phone last night that the Foundation, Shipyards of Victoria is sending up six of its best boxers to take part in the tournament and will have entries in every event.

In addition to the Foundation entries, Victoria is also sending up a number of speedy and scientific boxers and with the large Nanaimo and Ladysmith entry "hot" some interesting bouts are assured.

LOCAL CRICKET CLUB REORGANIZED FOR SEASON

Nanaimo Cricket Club Elects Officers and Will Hold Practices on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

There was a very encouraging turnout of cricketers at the meeting last night in the Board of Trade Rooms, and after very little discussion it was decided to reorganize. Officers were appointed for the season and the secretary instructed to get as many dates as possible with Victoria and Vancouver clubs. The membership fee was fixed at \$5.00, and it is hoped to get quite a respectable membership. Many of the old players are available, but new blood is wanted and any new players in town are cordially invited to join the club.

ERZBERGER WAS FORCED TO CHANGE IDEAS

Wished Germany to Impose Crushing Terms on the Allies if Successful in the Great War.

Paris, April 30.—The terms that Matthias Erzberger was in favor of imposing upon the Allies in the event of Germany being victorious, as set forth in a memorandum written by him in 1914 are outlined by a Geneva dispatch.

"Germany can not tolerate the presence on her frontiers of so-called neutral states insufficiently strong to preserve their neutrality, or which do not want to remain neutral," said Erzberger. "Her second aim must be to free herself from the insupportable leading strings of England on all questions of world policy. In the third place she must break up the Russian colossus."

"Germany must have sovereignty over Belgium and the French coast from Dunkirk to Boulogne and possession of the Channel Islands. She must take the mines in French Lorraine and create an African German Empire by annexing the Belgian and French Congo, British Nigeria, Dahomey and the French West Coast."

"In fixing indemnities the actual capacity of a state at the moment should not be considered. Besides, a large immediate payment supplemented by annual instalments spread over a long period, could be arranged. France would be helped in making them by decreasing her budget of naval and military appropriations. The indemnities should provide for repayment of the full costs of the war and the damages of war, the redemption of all of Germany's public debt and the creation of a vast fund for incapacitated soldiers."
