The Antigonish Water Works:

Mr. G. A. Vye, who has the contract for the construction of the water works away, an opinion verified beyond doubt at Antigonish, N. S., came to Moncton
Saturday night and remained over Sunday. Mr. Vye and his associates are rushing the work, already having about a mile of pipe laid and considerable done on the reservoir.
