## MANGLED BY THE CARS.

A Hamilton Cigar Maker Meets a Terrible Death.

STRUCK BY A BRACH TRAIN.

The waterworks bridge on the Beach division of the Grand Trunk was the scene of a fatal accident yesterday afternoon. The train due here from the Beach at 5.25 was running along at good rate of speed, and at the bridge the low hanging steps of the summer coaches strack Samuel Curran, a digarmaker of this city, inflicting injuries from which he died shortly after.

Curran, in company with William and James Flynn, of No. 158 Mary street, and John Almond, of No. 290 King street, went fishing early in the afternoon. He and James Flynn were on the bridge together when the train approached. Flynn was standing up, while Curran was scated on the edge of the trestie work. As soon as the train got uncomfortably close Flynn imped off the trestie-work, finding a more comfortable location on the side of the railway embankment. Poer Curran, who was a very big, heavy man, did not move quickly enough, and the engine and two cars had passed him before he attempted to rise from his sitting posture. As he did so he was struck by car step after car step, and simply rolled along like a ball for a distance of several feet. Considering his injuries, it was surprising that he lived a minute after. When the train was stopped Conductor Gibson and his crew got the injured man into a car and, after telegraphing to have the ambulance in readiness, came on to the city.

Curran was terribly injured. A deep gash in his forehead laid his head open from the nose up to the centre of his head. Both legs were broken in two places, several ribs were broken and his arms were also fractured. He never regained consciousness and only gasped a little as he was lifted into the ambulance.
