LITERATURE AND SCIENCE

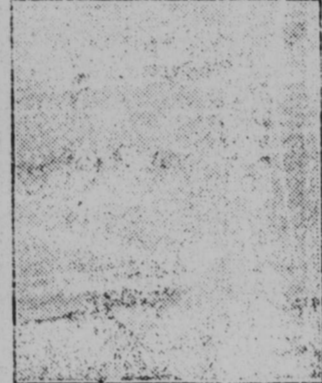
Although Canada cannot be said to have a very large number of men who have achieved distinction in the world of literature, yet there are a few who have attained this honour, and of whom she has every reason to be proud. Among this number is Sir Gilbert Parker, Kt., D.C.L., M.P., who

is a native of Belleville, Ont. He began his career by going overseas to work in Australia. He has travelled very extensively, and has written many books, the best known of which are "The Sons of the Mist", "The Right of Way" and "The Trail of the Scorp". He is now living in England. Sir James Macpherson, London, Kt., D.C.L., F.R.S.C., was born in Quebec in 1825. He is best known through his scientific and other publications, among which are "The Leaves" (to Vol. 1), "Quebec Past and Present", "L'Orthologie du Canada". He was President of the Royal Society of Canada for some time.

Sir James Alexander Grant, K.C., M.G., M.D., F.R.S.C., who in 1907 introduced the Pacific Railway Bill, is principally distinguished for his medical and scientific work. He has published works on Organic Heart Disease, and numerous essays

on various medical and scientific subjects. He was President of the Royal Society of Canada in 1903. Prominent as a philanthropist is Sir William Christopher Macdonald, Kt. He is a Governor of McGill University, and of the Montreal General Hospital, to the former of which he has given large endowments. He has established and endowed the Macdonald Agricultural College at Ste. Anne de Bellevue, at a cost of \$5,000,000.

The Canadian Mint.

The place where money is made or what is perhaps more accurate where it is created, is always appealed as most seemingly mysterious things do to the general reader. In Canada the Mint is located on Sussex Street at Ottawa. Here are made our gold and silver coins—the real money of the country. The paper medium of exchange is in the hands of the engraving firms and one does not see any trace of it in the Sussex Street establishment.

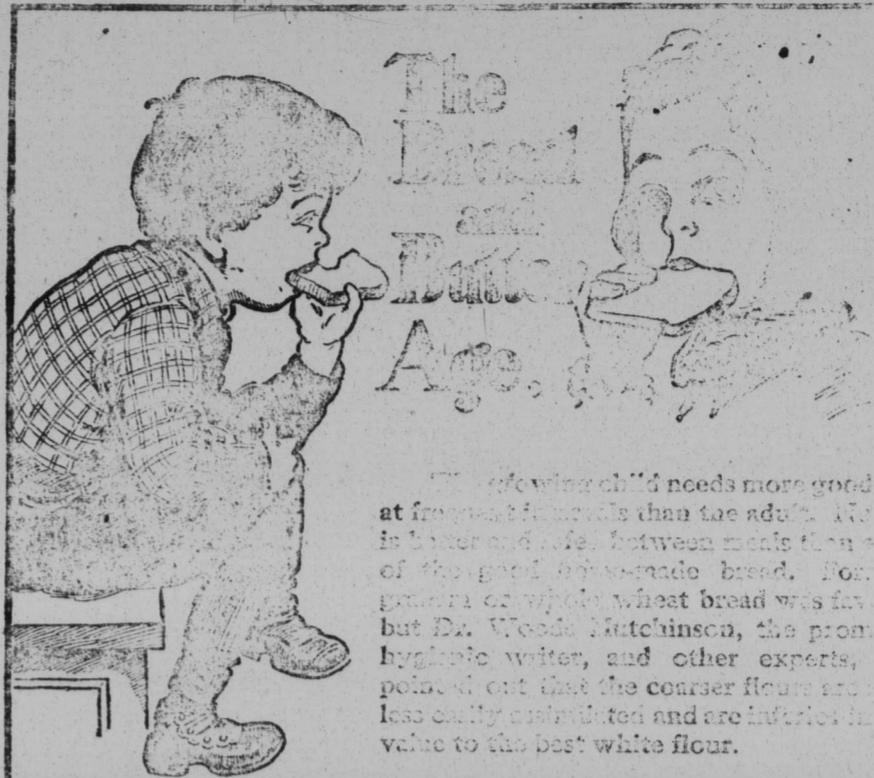
The Mint is open to visitors after certain formalities have been completed with. The essence of these, as with every thing connected with the institution is punctuality.

Unless the workman arrives exactly on time he finds himself locked out. It is necessary for him to telephone in and get a written order, before he is allowed to enter. Prior to the worker beginning his day he must change his clothes, put them in a locker which is locked and down special garments supplied by the Mint. The employees are not permitted to leave for dinner, therefore each department has a kitchen of its own, which supplies the midday meal to the staff. The metal to be used for the day's work is weighed out in the morning and no employee of the Mint is allowed to leave the building till the weight of the coins made and the material left over tally exactly with the weight of gold and silver handed out in the morning. Aside from all this, each member of the staff is locked in his or her department and is not permitted, even in case of illness to leave without a written permit. This, in the Mint, chances for dishonesty are reduced to a minimum.

The concluding process of weighing and automatically packing the coins into packages, requires the most finely adjusted machinery of all.

In this department is a scale so delicate that it had to be mounted on a stone pier, sunk in the ground down to bedrock.

This machine automatically weighs the coins, throwing them into three
