A SAD BLOW FOR CUBS.

Chicago, Oct. 10.—Before a frenzied, frantic mob of 25,000 persons, who refused to allow even a driving, drenching rain to dampen their ardor, the White Sox, driven to the next to the last ditch, rallied on the West-Side grounds today and scored the Cubs out of the game, winning 2 to 1. They nosed the West-Siders out in earnest, for Reulbach, stopping to wipe his nose in the ninth inning, made a balk, which brought Altier home with the winning run and gave the Sox the victory for which they had fought feverishly for nearly two hours. Reulbach literally blew the game away by blowing his nose, but the blow was preceded by a period of anxiety and Reulbach, who three times during the game had wobbled as if to throw the game away, was nervous and excited. The balk he made, probably will be the cause of the greatest baseball dispute that ever had raged in Chicago. The Cubs do not deny that Reulbach balked; that he stopped after starting his motion to deliver the ball to the plate, dropped his hands and wiped his nose. They admit that Reulbach balked, but complain that Walsh was permitted to talk repeatedly without penalty.

Toronto, Oct. 10.—15,000 people saw Jack Near, the Central Y.M.C.A. runner win the annual Ward Marathon along the Lake Shore road. The distance is about 39 miles and the winner's time was 1:59:12.3. R. H. Buxton, the Irish-Canadian A.C. was second; W. J. Melody, Hamilton Harriers, third; John Roe, West End Y.M.C.A. fourth. There were 192 entries. Longboat, who won the event for the past three years was unable to enter being a professional.

TIGERS BEATEN BY OTTAWA.

Ottawa, Oct. 10.—After a hotly contested game here on Saturday Ottawa's defeated the Hamilton Tigers by seven points to five. The game was won in last few minutes, the teams being on even terms during most of the play. At half time the score was 3-3. Both sides strained to the utmost but took few chances, with the result that the game was one long struggle between the front divisions, and there were few spectacular features. Each score was a rouse which indicates how evenly balanced the teams were. The attendance at the game was large and Hamilton sports, who came to Ottawa prepared to back their team heavily, lost considerable money.

LACROSSE.

Montreal, Oct. 10.—Montreal won the Eastern Lacrosse championship on Saturday, defeating the Shamrocks five to one in the second game of the play-off series. The Shamrocks won the first game on a muddy field a week previous to this, and went into Saturday's battle with a lead of two goals. On a dry field they were outclassed by their opponents. Nearly 10,000 witnessed the battle. Montreal will now challenge New Westminster for the Minto cup.

ARGOS LOSE TO MONTREAL.

Toronto, Oct. 10.—Montreal beat the Toronto Argonauts in the local opening game of the Inter-Provincial Rugby series by 13 to 5. Two thousand people saw the game. The visitors showed marked superiority in the back division. Montreal scored an unconverted try in the first quarter and a converted try in the second. Argos scored a touch-down goal, and goal from the field in the third quarter and Montreal's touch-in-goal in

the last period. Neither team showed much class.

VARSITY TRIMS QUEEN'S.

Kingston, Oct. 10.—Toronto University beat Queen's in the opening senior Inter-Collegiate Rugby game 7 to 1. There was no score at half time. Toronto got a try and a rouge in the second half.

MCGILL DEFEATS OTTAWA.

Montreal, Oct. 10.—McGill defeated Ottawa College by the score of 20 to 3 in the opening game of the Inter-Collegiate Rugby series, on the McGill campus Saturday afternoon. McGill has not won the championship cup since 1896, but this year Captain Gilmore has had a larger number of men than usual to choose from. In Saturday's match Ottawa was outclassed at every point, so it would be hard to say which McGill men deserved most credit for the victory. Every man seemed to know what to do, and generally did it. The whole McGill back line was strong at first. The game throughout was clean, open, interesting and fairly fast, not one penalty was handed out, and only one man, Gilligan of Ottawa, had to be carried off the field. He got a heavy fall in the latter part of the game.

ATTACK SPANISH CONSULATES.

Anarchists Make Violent Protests Against Prof. Ferrer's Arrest.
Amsterdam, Oct. 11.—A crowd attacked the Spanish consulate last night, clamoring for the release of Professor Ferrer, who is on trial in Barcelona for inciting the recent riots. They tried to destroy the consulate over the building and the police had to charge them twice before the mob scattered.

Zurich, Oct. 11.—A score or two of Spanish and Italian anarchists attacked the Spanish consulate last night as a protest against the trial of Prof. Ferrer at Barcelona. They broke all the windows and were preparing to burst open the door when the police arrived. The ringleader was arrested, but the others escaped and went to the residence of the Spanish consul. This was guarded by a force of gendarmes and the anarchists beat a retreat.

HURRICANE SWEEPS WITH TERRIFIC FURY

Key West, on Florida Coast, Struck at Daybreak by a 80 Mile-an-hour Storm, Which Raged About Noon—Storm Passed Up East Coast.

Key West, Fla., Oct. 11.—This city tonight is a mass of wreckage as a result of West Indian hurricane which rushed up from the Gulf today. At least one-half of the island city is in ruins tonight. The property loss is estimated at about \$3,000,000.

The city officials have asked the United States government to allow the regular troops to be used as guards until order is restored.

So far as known no human lives have been lost.

The property loss is appalling, over ten of the leading cigar factories being in ruins.

Terrible havoc was wrought on the shipping vessels in the harbor. There were over 100 vessels at anchor and of these only a few are left. The others were driven out to sea or cast on the beach.

The storm struck the city with full fury about day break, this morning and raged until noon, when it suddenly ceased. At times the wind blew 90 miles an hour. Late this afternoon the sun was shining and the only evidence of the gulf hurricane was the mass of wreckage. The storm passed up the east coast and it is feared that loss of life has been great in that section. There are many minor buildings were blown down or unroofed, almost all the trees were uprooted. Five persons were killed, one by an electric wire and the others by falling buildings. About twenty-five persons were injured. The greatest damage was done in the harbor, where forty or fifty lighters, launches and small tugs were either sunk or blown ashore. The Miami and the Plant line steamer Mimit from Key West, arrived safe at Casa Blanca this evening.

The total damage in Havana and vicinity is estimated at \$1,000,000. The great industrial loss has been caused by the destruction of half of the coal construction elevators in Casa Blanca, estimated at \$200,000. Communication with the interior of the island has been interrupted.

700 Fatalities Reported.
New Orleans, Oct. 12.—Wireless dispatches this morning report more than 700 lives lost in Florida Keys in yesterday's hurricane. The property damage will run into millions at Key West and not a settlement in Florida Keys escaped. After devastating Havana and part of Cuba the storm raced at a hundred mile an hour ball across the Gulf of Florida. Many vessels were sunk.

Total Fatalities 1,500.
Jacksonville, Fla., Oct. 12.—It is reported here that the fatalities of the Key West hurricane will reach 1,500.

Remains Sent to England.
Montreal, Que., Oct. 11.—The remains of the late A. Muir Wilson, once a member of the British Parliament for Sheffield, arrived in this city this afternoon from Vancouver. Major Harris will accompany the body to England.

EASTERN CAPITAL BUYS JASPER WEST PROPERTY.

The sale has just been completed of the property at the northwest corner of Jasper avenue and Eight street, lot 87, block 8 H. B. R., known as the Degendoff corner. The purchaser is W. J. Gibbard, a well known furniture manufacturer of Naperville, Ont., and the price paid is in the vicinity of \$25,000. The lot has a frontage of 50 feet on Jasper and is 150 feet deep. The sale was put through by Magrath, Hart & Co.

Mr. Gibbard intends holding the property for investment. He has visited the city and the cities of the west and thinks Edmonton's future is the greatest of them all. His recent visit was the third to this city and on each occasion he has become more enthusiastic over its prospects. His recent investment shows his faith in the city.

ADOPT EDMONTON SYSTEM

Calgary, Alta., Oct. 11.—At a meeting of the council today it was decided that Commissioners Graves and Clark would cease to act as such, and their successors, probably themselves, should be appointed by council, thus amending the idea of civic government by commission. The new law will provide that the commissioner receiving the largest number of Aldermanic votes will serve two years the other one year. Both men will succeed themselves.

Alderman Hornby was appointed representative to investigate the needs of farmers and ranchers in the burned district northwest of Calgary and to co-operate with the Dominion government in supplying the assistance they require.

Three Years for Robbing Mails.
Victoria, B.C., Oct. 8.—Frederick Babage, a post office employee found guilty of stealing from the mails, was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary today. The sentence was light owing to the prisoner having a wife and family.
