It was the intention of the late Government that as soon as the fown of Grand Falls should b established with a fixed population that Mr. Burt would proceed ther and take up his residence. ately after the late General Election the present Government found it ne cessary to provide for their defeated candidate for Fogo District, Mr. Fitzgerald, and without regard to cost o lagistrate for Grand Falls. To-day oth Mr. Burt and Mr. Fitzgerald have urisdiction as Stipendiary Magis rates at that place. If this was no piece of political jobbery and a wil ul waste of the public funds he wa ing greatly mistaken.


