Under the Maple Leaf.

CANADIAN ATLANTIC STATION WHICH INCLUDES NEWFOUNDLAND ABSOLUTELY UNDER CANADA'S OWN CARE.

On Tuesday last we drew attention to the Naval Agreement which had been made at the Imperial Conference at which Premier Sir Edward Morris and Colonial Secretary, Hon. Robert Watson, attended. We pointed out that the Atlantic zone which had been placed absolutely under Canada's own care included the part of the Atlantic which bordered Newfoundland and extended to the east of Newfoundland and Labrador for a thousand miles, and to the south also for a greater distance. A reference to a clause of the agreement, the text of which we published to-day, shows that the naval services and forces of the Dominion of Canada are to be exclusively under the control of the Dominion Government. The Canadian flag will be flown at the Jack staff in place of the Union Jack as a symbol that the ships are under the exclusive control of the Dominion, and the Union Jack will not be flown as a standing reminder that the Imperial Admiralty has no control over them. Even in time of war the Canadian Navy will not co-operate with Imperial Navy unless specially placed at the disposal of the Imperial authorities by the Canadian Government.

How the London Globe interprets all this may be seen by a perusal of the extracts which we publish elsewhere in this issue. Referring to the Laurier doctrine the comment runs thus: "It has also been put to use in Canada itself as shown in Laurier's Montreal speech that he has established a free maritime zone both on the Atlantic and Pacific, which shall be absolutely under Canada's own care." We have emphasized the last few words, inasmuch as Newfoundland is a part and parcel of the zone which "shall be absolutely under Canada's own care."

Great Hauls of Fish.

Great Improvement at Indian Harbor and Vicinity.

To-day the Minister of Marine and Fisheries had the following telegram from Indian Harbor: "Fish in abundance at Fire Island and vicinity; 150 qts. to a haul." This goes to show that the fish is striking along shore down the coast from White Bears to Cape Harrison and Cape Argford. This coast line covers about 400 miles and will bring the aggregate catch of Labrador up to a good average.

Big Sensation on Water Street.

To-day quite a sensation occurred along Water Street when the report went round that the principals of a large firm were investigating some supposed irregularities. We learn that for some time past certain irregularities have been suspected and the principals of the firm have been quietly on the alert. They believe they have enough to warrant them in suspending and perhaps dismissing an officer one of the coastal posts and also the head of one of the principal departments. It is suspected the men acted in collusion with shipments of lobsters, &c., and that big money is involved in the transactions of which they are supposed to be guilty. Up to 12:30 p.m. the police had no information.
