GREECE HELD OUT.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day.

Greece held out for addition to protocol until last moment when she was assured by Turkey that all conventions prevailing before war could resume their effectiveness until opportunity was given to discuss the points of issue in protocol which Greece wanted appended to treaty and embodied in the reservations by allies of points yet to be discussed with the Powers, such as financial post bellum settlement, fate of Aegean Islands, frontiers of Albania and Bulgaria. Turkey refused absolutely to have anything to do with protocol, regarding it as too likely to open up fresh undesirable discussion. The latter displays lack of deference to Powers. While peace of London may end war with Turkey, it may be a signal for strife among allies. The speech of the Serbian Premier in Parliament at Belgrade, when he explained that Serbia desired modification of Treaty with Bulgaria regarding division of territory, instead of allying excitement it increased it to such an extent it is not likely now that his meeting with Premier Guechoff, of Bulgaria on frontier will take place. All efforts of Russia to bring about peace between Bulgaria and Serbia have apparently failed. The worst is feared. Meanwhile the Allies are throwing enormous bodies of troops into Macedonia for the purpose of occupying disputed territory. The relations between Bulgaria and Greece are still extremely strained. The Bulgarians thus far have refused to create a neutral zone at Salonki where the Greek Premier is waiting to meet the Bulgarian General Ivanoff.
