

### The Good Genius of the Sick Room.

A gas fire, always a desirable installation, never proves its worth more than in cases of illness, for an invalid may need a fire at any season of the year. A coal fire makes dirt and dust and needs repeated attention, and the noise and clatter that the least stoking operation renders inevitable is at once an annoyance and a possible danger to the patient.

Gas fires are clean and noiseless, and when once alight will burn for an indefinite period without supervision of any kind, and it is now the common practice of medical men, especially when the illness is likely to be lengthy, to recommend a gas fire in the sick room.

When children are convalescent but still confined to one room, it is highly necessary, if the much-dreaded chill is to be avoided, to keep its temperature at a steady level. This is impossible where coal is the fuel, but a gas fire can be so easily and accurately regulated that the required degree of warmth can be obtained without difficulty.

### Prohibition at Greenspond.

The prohibition campaign is in full swing here. Dr. Geisel gave us a wonderful lecture on Sunday night on Prohibition. St. James' Hall, the largest in the place, was packed with grown folk.

On Monday morning, at 10 o'clock, Dr. Geisel addressed the people, chiefly women and children, on the subject of Health. She dealt a good deal on the different foods the body wanted, and where and how they could be obtained. The lecture occupied nearly two hours, but so interested were the audience that they had had almost forgotten time. We all feel sure that the lecture will have a lasting effect on this place. Immediately after the lecture a committee of women was formed called the "Women's Auxiliary Committee of Health and Temperance." All women present signified their willingness to act on this committee. The officers were appointed right away. This committee meets to-night to organize for work.

On the 18th inst. we held a very successful Prohibition meeting in the F. P. U. Hall, or rather I should say in the Burnett Orange Hall, both societies using the same building. The place was crowded. Capital addresses were given by Rev. Moore, Rev. French, Ensign Oake, Capt. James Bandford and Mr. S. White. Mr. K. Oakley acted as chairman. A test was put to the electors at the close of the meeting, when at least nine out of every ten present stood to their feet, thereby showing their intention of voting for prohibition.

Another successful prohibition meeting was held last night at Shamblie's Cove in the F. P. U. Hall. The meeting was addressed by Rev. Nottle, Ensign Oake, Dr. Jamieson, Mr. A. Vivian and Rev. French. When the test was put at the close of the meeting, only two or three of the voters present kept their seats, while all the others rose to their feet, showing their intention of voting this demon out of Newfoundland. Without doubt Greenspond and vicinity will give an overwhelming majority in favour of Prohibition.

The Prohibition Committee have planned another meeting at Fair Islands for to-morrow night. Quite a number from here have signified their intention of going with us. So far as we can learn at this distance, the feeling there is strongly for prohibition.

## YOUR BOYS AND GIRLS
