## To-day's Messages.

THE BRITISH ARMY IN FRANCE.

(By the Associated Press.)

IN THE southern sector of the front, and a long fierce battle in the north have fallen to the Allies.

The latest information from the front is that the British counter-attack on the night of the 24th and 25th was not only successful but also a heavy cost of life to the enemy.

### A GERMAN REPORT.

BERLIN, To-day.—The Zeebrugge-German naval operations off Flanders coast, says an official report to-day by the German Admiralty, have in no way been impeded by the British.

The speaker gave an account of a journey from Cape Gregory to La Scie, describing the scenery and the life of the people, of whom he said there was no more hospitable to be found anywhere. The district has sent forth many of its best and ablest young men to fight the King's battles, and while it is farthest away from St. John's it ranked third in recruiting. At the close of the lecture Mr. R. W. Jones proposed and Mr. C. Hunt seconded a vote of thanks, which was carried by acclamation.

Rev. (Capt.) Clayton, who presided, drew of the meeting Rev. E. Andrews of St. John's and Mr. P. K. Devine, both of whom made short replies expressing their pleasure at Mr. Mott's address. On next Thursday night the season will be closed. A special programme is being prepared as His Lordship Bishop White will honor the Club by his presence.

### A Tale of a Tail Light.

A well known motorist, who has distinguished himself in the King's service in the far eastern theatre of war, was up before Judge Morris this morning charged with a breach of Section 5 of the Motor Car Act of 1906 and 1911. The complainant, a police officer, stated that on the 23rd and 24th insts. the defendant was driving a car to which there was no tail light attached. However having heard the "tale," Judge Morris took into consideration the services the young chauffeur had rendered to the Empire and therefore dismissed the case.

### MORE AIRPLANES AND BETTER TANKS.

LONDON, To-day.—Referring to the German War Minister's claim to the capture of more than twice the number of guns that he has announced, Churchill said the German claim was grotesquely exaggerated and untrue. The supply of airplanes had been for some time in advance of development by squadrons, and they were making now in a single week more airplanes than were made in 1914. Churchill said the building of tanks had been so accelerated that the Ministry was in a position to replace every tank lost by one of a new and better pattern as fast as the country could take the delivery.

### HUNS MUST NOW OPERATE FROM OSTEND.

LONDON, To-day.—The Associated Press learns from a high naval source that the operations at Zeebrugge were a complete success, with the result that the German Flanders flotilla will now be obliged to resort to the Ostend route, from which British forces can more easily handle the German ships. The loss of a dredger together with a blocking up of the channel, must result in the speedy silt up of the waterway, and will take several weeks to clear the passage.

### PUT NOT TRUST IN THE GERMANS.

MOSCOW, To-day.—M. Tentcherin, the Bolshevik Foreign Minister, has asked Germany, according to the official news agency, to give a guarantee that the Russian Black Sea fleet, while remaining at Sebastopol, will not be seized or damaged by forces of the Central Powers of their allies now advancing into the Crimea, nor by any other naval or military force of that Alliance. The Foreign Minister has taken this action.
