#### HOME RULE BILL THROUGH COMMITTEE.

LONDON, Oct. 29. The Irish Home Rule Bill was passed through the House of Commons to-day, without any further important amendment. Some important modifications are intended by the Government, including the question of making candidates for Parliament take the oath of allegiance. These were postponed during the report stage of the Bill. Discussions in Committee, throughout, have been difficult, owing to the fact that Labor and Liberal members declined to participate in committee sessions.

#### BODY AT CORK.

CORK, Oct. 29. The body of Terence MacSwiney, late Lord Mayor of this city, arrived here on board an Admiralty tug this afternoon. The tug, whose flag was flown at half mast, docked at Custom house quay. Enormous crowds lined the opposite quays and nearby bridges.

#### BOSTON'S TRIBUTE.

BOSTON, Oct. 29. A solemn High Mass of Requiem for the repose of the soul of the late Lord Mayor Terence MacSwiney of Cork, was sung in the Cathedral of Holy Cross to-day, with Cardinal O'Connell officiating.

#### PARIS MOURNS.

PARIS, Oct. 29. A largely attended Requiem High Mass was celebrated in honor of the late Lord Mayor MacSwiney of Cork, in St. Joseph's Church, in Avenue Hoche, to-day.

#### MESSAGE FROM THE SEA.

NEW YORK, Oct. 29. The steamship Rambler, plying between Key West and Havana, was reported drifting southwest of Santiago Cuba, with fifty passengers on board and no water, in a wireless despatch received here to-night by the Naval Communication Service. The message said a Cuban gunboat sent to the rescue, had returned and reported that no trace of the vessel could be found. The wireless despatch was sent from a station at Jamaica West Indies, and was intercepted by the steamship City of Sherman, which relayed it to New York.

#### MEMORIAL SERVICE FOR MONARCH.

PARIS, Oct. 29. The French Government, the Diplomatic Corps and the Greek Colony in Paris paid a final tribute to the late King Alexander of Greece, in impressive services conducted at the Greek Church this afternoon, simultaneously with a funeral service for the deceased Monarch in Athens.

#### SPANISH ANGILOPHOBES.

MADRID, Oct. 29. Three arrests of Catalan Nationalists have been made in connection with a demonstration carried out at Barcelona yesterday, by students, in front of the British Consul.

ate, where they cheered for Ireland and free Catalonia, and shouted "down with England" and smashed the windows of the Consulate when their demands for an interview with the Consul were declined. The Governor of Barcelona paid a visit to-day to the Consul, who had made an official protest over the incident, the Governor explaining the circumstances leading up to the demonstration. The government has sent a dispatch to the Spanish Ambassador in London, minimizing the importance of the incident.

#### MONTREAL'S MEMORIAL SERVICE.

MONTREAL, Oct. 30. Over seven thousand people attended the Memorial Service for the late Terence MacSwiney, held in the Arena last night, Mayor Martin presiding.

#### THE ADRIATIC QUESTION.

ROME, Oct. 30. Negotiations between the Italians and Jugo Slavs to settle the Adriatic question will be begun early in November, according to a semi-official note.

#### The Argentia Terminus.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—Having read with much interest the very interesting letter over the non do plume of Fisherman from Placentia in yesterday's News with regard to the railway terminus being placed at the South Side of Argentia Hr. instead of the North Side, I wish to say that he is quite right as far as obtaining a supply of fresh water from Salmonier River or from the adjacent ponds, but on the other hand I cannot agree with him that the Commission is in error in selecting Sandy Cove as the terminus. It is the best site in the Harbor, furthermore, with regard to the carrying of water, this can be easily done, as the ponds from where the supply of water would come from are at a fairly high elevation above Marquis Neck.

With regard to the conditions in Argentia Hr. or Little Placentia (as we knew it in our boyhood days), I don't think there will be much danger of its being frozen over very often, except in very hard winters such as we used to have thirty or forty years ago. While on the other hand, it must be admitted that Great Placentia with its roadstead practically open to the west and northwest winds, is at times inconvenient for shipping, meantime, I do not suppose it is the intention of the Government or the Commission to allow such an important centre between the eastern and western section of Newfoundland to be entirely abandoned with regard to its commercial facilities.

Fisherman calls the attention of his readers to its splendid Church, Hall, Convent and Schools, also the Grand Memorial, which is the first erected in Newfoundland, in Honour of the Volunteer Sons of Placentia, who laid down their lives in the Great War, which we have just passed through, and also the well stocked business places, but he does not suggest or demand a remedy, such as, the reconstruction of the wharf in the roadstead of Placentia, so that it may be made a continuous port of call for inward and outward bound steamers in addition to Argentia.

In other countries where important business centres have suffered by the closing down of some great industry or sweeping changes such as, the changing of the Railway Terminus at Placentia, the Government looks around for a remedy. For instance, Holyhead in Wales, where a crescent shaped pier nearly three miles in length at a cost of many millions of dollars has been built into the Irish Channel to make a port of call for Atlantic liners on the Liverpool and New York route.

As a native of this grand old District, where the corner stone of the British Empire beyond the seas was first laid, I make no apology for suggesting that the Government, as a recompense for the loss of trade which Placentia is bound to suffer by the removal of the Railway Terminus, make a special grant, of say \$75,000 to \$100,000, and rebuild the old Placentia road from Salmonier in St. Mary's Bay to Placentia. The reopening of this road would mean the spending of thousands of dollars by tourists as well as the wealthy citizens of St. John's, who could motor there in a few hours for the week end excursion. Placentia apart from its historic associations, can never be regarded other than the "Venice" of Newfoundland.

#### Coal Development.

The people of Newfoundland have so often been disappointed in their expectations of being able to purchase and use coal mined in their own country, that they cannot be blamed for being sceptical when they hear, or read new reports of coal developments on the West Coast.

Be that as it may, we believe that we are gradually leading up to the time when plenty of coal for all home use will be forthcoming from the areas on the West Coast. Already the Railway Commissioners are using the South Branch Coal on their trains. The five large motor trucks that were imported here last week have been taken out and are used to convey the coal from the South Branch seam to the main railway, a distance of a little over three miles.

It is said that the "Freeman" coal is superior to that at South Branch and that there is no doubt of the quantity being in the St. George's area. The Gas Co. have tested this coal and have expressed themselves as well pleased with its qualities for gas production. It has been proved by competent tests to be equal to that imported from the United States. It is to be regretted, in view of the urgency of the Gas Co. and the restriction of trade in consequence, that a greater effort has not been made to place this coal on the market.

Negotiations with the Government, it is said, are still at a deadlock, but we hope for the sake of all concerned, that every effort will be used to successfully accomplish a mutually satisfactory agreement and that coal from this area will soon be within reach of the public, both for domestic and commercial purposes.

Now that citizens have to pay \$20.00 per ton for coal, it is time for the Country to wake up and bring inducement to bear upon the Government to provide cheaper coal for the people.—Trade Review.

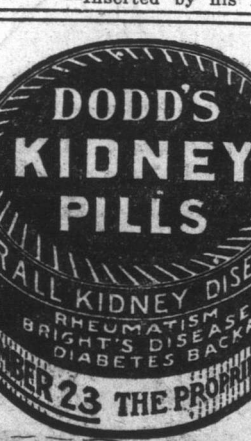
